

HONORS SAN FRANCISCO ARCHITECT

For Release Sunday, May 3

San Francisco, May 3, 1970 - - - Neill Smith, an architect in San Francisco for 15 years, has been elected to the College of Fellows of the American Institute of Architects, a lifetime honor bestowed for outstanding contribution. He will be formally invested during special ceremonies at the annual convention of the A.I.A. in Boston, June 21-25.

Although A.I.A. is the 23,300-member national professional society of architects, only 957 members have been advanced to Fellowship. As a Fellow, Mr. Smith will have the right to use the initials F.A.I.A. following his name to symbolize the esteem in which he is held by his peers. Other than the Gold Medal, which may be presented to a single architect from any part of the world, Fellowship is the highest honor which The Institute can bestow on its members.


Mr. Smith was born in New York City and received a Master of Fine
Arts degree from Princeton University. A member of A.I.A. for
10 years, his participation in civic affairs has included the
Mill Valley Architectural Review Committee, San Francisco Planning
and Urban Renewal Association, A.I.A. Laison Committee to San
Francisco City Planning Department, American Civil Liberties Union,
and the San Francisco Program for the Aging.

A principal in the firm of Neill Smith and Associates, Mr.

Smith's work has been devoted to university and other public commissions. His major projects include Eichler Summit, Woodside Gardens, Sacramento Collegetown, Redwood National Bank, Westmont College Dormitories and Library, and Granny Goose Foods Administration Building.

He numbers among his national design awards the following: HUD Merit Award for Westmont College Dormitories; 1967 AIA Honor Award for Redwood National Bank; 1968 HUD Merit Award for Sacramento Collegetown, Phase I; 1968 HUD Merit Award for Woodside Gardens; 1969 AIA Honor Award for Sacramento Collegetown, Phase I; and selection by the AIA of Woodside Gardens as one of five projects to represent the United States at the World Congress of Architects, Buenos Aires, 1969. The regional awards that Neill Smith has received include a 1963 Bay Region Merit Award for Redwood Medical Building, a 1968 Certificate of Excellence in the Governor's Design Awards for Redwood National Bank, and a 1969 AIA Bay Area Merit Award for Granny Goose Foods Administration Building. As a contributor to professional journals, he has written the following: "Wurster Hall - The Campus Rebel," P/A Observer, 1966; "Let's Take A New Look At Renewal," Architectural Record, December, 1960; and "Design/Three Approaches," AIA Journal, December 1960.

Mr. Smith resides at 3825 Paradise Drive in Tiburon, California.

OBITUARIES

Neill Smith

A memorial service is planned for Neill Smith, 60, a former San Francisco architect and environmentalist, who died Sunday of lung cancer in Petaluma.

Mr. Smith founded Neill Smith Associates architectural firm in San Francisco in 1961. He left the firm in 1971 to found Whole Systems in Mill Valley, an environmental research and development firm, to explore solid waste recycling and alternative fuel and power systems.

A native of Brooklyn, he earned his architectural degree from Princeton University and immediately moved to San Francisco.

His architect firm won more than 50 national and international awards for design excellence. One was for the design of the Capitol Mall in Sacramento. He also was cit-

ed for the International Science Center in Sunnyvale and the Navajo Tribal Government Center in Window Rock, Ariz.

Asilomar Conference Grounds in Pacific Grove and the Eichler Summit apartment building at 999 Green Street in San Francisco were also his projects.
