It seems to our Committee on Practice A.I.A. only fair to you to acquaint you with certain statements which have come into our hands which in touching on your professional ethics reflect adversely on the profession as represented by the Istitute.

If the recent statement that you are indebted to W. C. Ilgenfrits in the sum of about \$400.00, was the sole basis for the foregoing statement, we would feel that we were in no way justified in mentioning the matter, since it is not the province of the Institute to act as a collecting agency. However it is the friendly office of all Institute activities to acquaint a member of such a fact as that in August, 1924, I was advised that formal charges of unprofessional conduct would be preferred against you and the matter was referred to a sub-committee for investi-In October the Chairman of this committee reported to me that these charges had been dropped because the complainant had /learned that you seemed to be trying to "do the right thing". Our Committee felt that unless we informed you of these facts it would not be doing the friendly thing.

My dear Mr. Sparklin:

At the December meeting of the Benedosf Directors of the Institute your name appeared on the list of delinquent members who are indebted for Institute dues for more than one year - as of December, 1927.

The Board took action on the list as a whole to the effect that those not making payment in full, or some arrangement with the Treasurer as to future payment - before February 15, 1928 - must lose their memberships.

This will acknowledge receipt of the application of Mr. William O. Sparklin for readmission to membership in The Institute and the Florida North Chapter, together with his check for \$10.00 and the Favorable Recommendation of the Chapter.

Mr. Sparklin's membership in The Institute terminated on December 31, 1928 for the non-payment of Institute dues. He owed dues for 1927 and 1928 in the total amount of \$50.00.

Florida was in more or less of a pioneer stage at the time and the local architects seemed to resent my being here instead of extending the customary welcome to a fellow professional. I am glad to say that conditions have changed in the above respect.

I was approached here to become a member again on the new enrollment basis, after having explained my status in detail. I agreed, filled out the application and filed same with my check. After some time, I was informed that inasmuch as I had been a member, I would be required to pay an additional fee, which I did. Now this last letter places another light on the subject.

The amount of money involved is not a great stumbling block, but the manner in which my application has been handled does dampen my desire to follow through.

"This, of course, is good practice, but there may be individual cases in which it makes a hard-ship, so please be assured of our best cooperation in putting your reinstatement forward in the light of the above and our letter of May 25 to Mr. Seymour."

He has not responded to this letter.

Only The Board of The Institute has power to remit dues. It will meet in Cincinnati on December 13-15 and if the Florida Borthern Chapter will recommend to The Board that the unpaid dues of Mr. Sparklin for the years 1927-28 in the sum of \$50.00 be remitted, because of the loss of his letter of resignation subsitted in 1927, or for other unusual circumstances — we believe that The Board would take favorable action.
