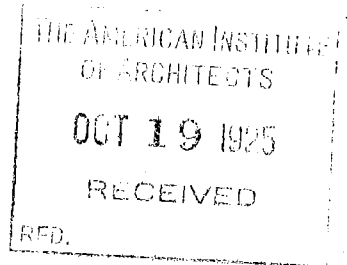

Gentlemen:

While the writer was able, by dint of great sacrifice, to keep up his dues during the leaner years of the depression, others, equally and more able, failed to remit their dues. The Board saw fit to remit those dues which were not paid, upon certain conditions which appear most unfair to those who had paid their dues in full, and who are now unable to meet their obligations.

The writer is loathe to contract any obligations which he cannot see his way clear to meet. He can, therefore, take but one course, namely, to assume whatever he now owes as an obligation to be met in the future when conditions permit, and to resign from the American Institute of Architects as of even date.

In taking this action, the writer wishes to express his individual appreciation to those officers, directors and members who have sacrificed so nobly of their time, their efforts and their practices to carry on the work and the ideals of the profession and the Institute, and sincerely regrets that conditions entirely beyond his control have made mandatory this severing of his connections from a group whose company he so thoroughly enjoyed and whose efforts he so deeply appreciates.

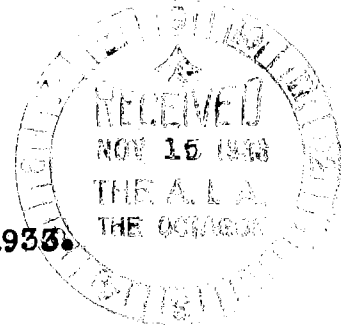

My dear Mr. Sukert:

At the November meeting of the Executive Committee of the Institute, your resignation was reported, but was not acted upon.

The members of the Committee did not want to lose your support of the Institute and the Detroit Chapter at this critical time for the architectural profession.

In view of the recommendation of the Committee, to be made to the Convention, that the dues be reduced and that old accounts be readjusted, it is hoped that you can find it possible to continue your membership.

Herewith is copy of President Russell's letter of January 1st, which is self-explanatory.

If the new plan is approved, your indebtedness of \$25.00 for 1933 will be remitted; you will be entitled to a credit of \$5.00 a year on the books of the Institute for the next five years; and your net annual dues for 1934 will be \$10.00.

There will be a meeting of the Board in early May, in advance of the Convention. It is specially requested that you advise as to your wishes in this matter - that is, shall your resignation stand, or will you continue with the Institute and the Chapter under the conditions indicated above?

But we hope very much that you will follow the latter course.

Lancelot Sukert, 77, Retired As FHA's Chief Architect

Lancelot Sukert, 77, a retired chief architect with the Federal Housing Authority, died of a heart attack Saturday at his home, 4000 Cathedral Ave. NW.

Mr. Sukert was a native of Detroit and received a bachelor of science degree from the University of California in 1913.

He did graduate work in architecture at Columbia University and received a graduate degree in architecture from University of Pennsylvania in 1917.

He served as a lieutenant in the Air Corps during World War

After the war, he practiced as an architect in Detroit for 20 years, specializing in the design of churches.

In 1928, Mr. Sukert was elected president of the Michigan Society of Architects and later cited for outstanding services for his two years in that office.

He joined the Federal Housing Authority in 1939 and served as chief architect for 15 years. He retired in 1954 and established and conducted free art classes in numerous District Episcopal churches.

Mr. Sukert was a member of the Army and Navy Town Club and the Christ Episcopal Church.

He leaves his wife, Bertha Eyalyn, of the home address.
