

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My dear Mr. Kemper:-

I am just in receipt of your letter of Feby. 10th, forwarded to me here from Kansas City -- in reference to the matter of my indebtedness to the Institute.

In reply I wish to state, that I have not communicated with your Treasurer regarding this matter, because I had been hoping against hope that when I did, I would be able to send something more satisfactory to him than a letter of explanation.

Your letter calls for immediate recognition, therefore I will at once try to explain why I have allowed myself to become so far in arrears in Institute dues, humiliating as it is for me to do so.

Since the war began, and since, I have had hardly enough business to pay necessary personal expenses and those of my family. While the war was on I had no commissions whatever, and was obliged to borrow as much money as I was able, in order to live. In August last the situation had become so acute that in order to repay those from whom I had borrowed, and to meet ordinary living expenses, I accepted a position as draftsman with Mr. Ralph H. Cameron, with whom I have been since September 10, last. The salary is hardly adequate to meet all my obligations for I have been trying to clear off the more pressing ones and have succeeded to a degree. but there are still many debts to be met and among them is my debt to the Institute.

How long my work here will last, I have no means of knowing, and what information I am able to get regarding the outlook in Kansas City does not look very encouraging. Meantime, I am liquidating as rapidly as possible but the fact that I have still many obligations to meet almost appals me and I find myself wondering what is going to happen if Mr. Cameron's work should fall off.

My family is in Kansas City, and that fact, coupled with the fact that my salary hardly enables me to keep them in sufficient funds, supply my own wants and meet as best I may my obligations makes my predicaments very hard to bear.

If any way opens so that I may be able to liquidate, if only in part—my indebtedness to the Institute before March 6, I will be very glad to remit whatever amount I am able.

I am sorry to have to write what may seem to you a long and perhaps useless letter explaining a condition that, no do ubt, confronts others of the profession, but as you have asked for an answer the only thing for me to do is to comply with your request, whether either I or the Institute derive any benefit. The whole situation has become very trying to me, and particularly so when I think of severing my connection with the Institute under such circumstances for I have been very proud of the fact that I had had the honor to be associated with such a body. Please pardon my using long hand, I did not dare to trust this to the office stenographer nor to a public one.

May I ask for a reply?
