

Dear Mr. Kemper,

The information sent you last week with regard to Mr. J. Lawrence Aspinwall, who has been proposed for Fellowship at the coming Convention, was incomplete in some particulars. I wish to supplement it by the following information which has just reached me:

Mr. Aspinwall studied for several years with Prof. A. Colian, a French engineer and architect in New York City. In 1875 he entered the office of the late James Renwick, and took charge of the work going on at St. Patrick's Cathedral, 5th avenue & 50th street. In 1880 he was taken into partnership with Mr. Renwick, who have had associated with them at various times in the firm Mr. William H. Russell, Mr. W. W. Renwick, Mr. Walter T. Owen and Mr. Fitz-Henry Faye Tucker. Mr. Aspinwall is now the senior member of the firm of Renwick, Aspinwall & Tucker.


