

2. Describe nominee's notable work in design, to bring out the particular achievements the nominators believe have notably contributed to the advancement of the profession.

The work of Wurster, Bernardi and Emmons has been widely published and honored, both in the United States and abroad. The philosophy and goals of the firm are fully shared by the three partners, and their design is an extension of that philosophy. Each of the partners takes the lead in certain projects, although it is difficult to differentiate the work of one partner from that of the firm itself. The photographic exhibit supporting this nomination will include examples of projects on which Donn Emmons has been partner—in-charge and chiefly responsible for the design.

The same principles of design that gained an early reputation for the firm in residential work have increasingly, in the past 15 years, been applied to public, commercial, and industrial buildings: an avoidance of any set "style", an honest and direct architectural solution growing out of the needs of the client; the extensive use of natural materials, and great attention to optimum use of the site.

Nominee's Achievement in Design (continued)

In the book "Architecture, Ambition, and Americans" (1955), the author, Wayne Andrews, says of the houses designed by the firm that they "are without parallel in the art of bringing the outdoors in and the indoors out -- a feat often attempted in our time and more often bungled." The author goes on to say of Donn Emmons himself that he "excels in simple but strangely elegant interiors."

"Quality Budget Houses" by Thomas Creighton and Katherine Ford (1954) makes the statement that houses in California and the Northwest, designed by such architects as Wurster, Bernardi and Emmons and others "have set a trend towards natural finishes which is now widespread and very sensible as well as very beautiful."

The Italian architectural magazine, "Casabella", in its April 1960 issue, says that in observing the work of the firm "one is immediately struck by the almost intentional modesty, honesty, informality and lack of strain." Again, "the indifference to style is as sincere as it is apparent." Their "understanding of social and economic conditions, climatic variances, materials, and method of building has stimulated an architectural expression that has been described as the Bay Region Style."

In 1956, when Wurster, Bernardi and Emmons won three awards in the National Honor Awards Program of the American Institute of Architects, Time magazine wrote that the firm's "open, uncluttered designs, broad windows, and lavish use of natural wood have made it the leader in one of the best regional movements inthe United States. This week's prizewinners sum up the partners' goal: to disregard any preconceived formulas, fit each design both to the terrain and to the building's occupants and purpose."

In 1958, when the Institute of Personality Assessment and Research at the University of California, Berkeley, undertook a study of the nation's "40 most creative architects", Donn Emmons was included as one of that number. The purpose of the study was "to discover those characteristics which differentiate highly creative individuals from less original and creative persons." Some of the findings of this study were published in the September 1960 issue of the AIA Journal.

NOMINEE'S ACHIEVEMENTS IN SERVICE TO THE INSTITUTE

1. State fully the nominee's signal service to The Institute, his chapter, or his state organization, or to the profession, which the nominators believe has notably contributed to the advancement of the profession, and list the offices in architectural organizations occupied by the nominee and the period of each.

Donn Emmons, after serving for three years on the Executive Committee of the Northern California Chapter, AIA, was unanimously elected President of the Chapter in 1953. Under his forthright leadership, the Chapter embarked on a progressive program which soon established it as one of the most active and influential Chapters in the country. During Mr. Emmons' presidency, the Chapter engaged its first Public Relations Counsel, and its first Executive Secretary, and began to make its voice heard in matters of civic importance. It was during his term that the City of San Francisco, after years of urging by the Chapter, adopted a Master Plan for the Civic Center. A factor that undoubtedly influenced their decision was an extensive exhibit, arranged by the Chapter and held at the De Young Museum, showing Civic Center planning in major cities in the United States and in Europe.

In 1956-57, Mr. Emmons served as Chairman of the Public Relations Committee of the Northern California Chapter, and continued to support the progressive and broad program he had initiated during his presidency.

As a Director of the California Council of Architects (now the California Council, AIA) concurrently with his term as Chapter President (1953-54) he assisted in the revitalization of that organization. He participated in the Council's search for an Executive Director, and supported the choice of Melton Ferris, who in the years since has done an outstanding job of representing California architects in the State Capitol, and has greatly increased the Council's effectiveness in dealing with professional matters at State level.

So highly respected are Donn Emmons' organizational ability and judgement that when the Chapter was asked to host the 1960 AIA National Convention, he was appointed General Convention Chairman. That Convention was the largest (except for the Centennial) of any in Institute history. It was the consensus of the Chapter that its success was in large measure due to Mr. Emmons' wise and calm leadership, and his ability to coordinate and direct the activities of the many people involved in Convention planning. A commemorative placque was presented to him by the Chapter "in grateful recognition of his devoted and skillful leadership."

Donn Emmons' record of public service has paralleled his service to the Institute, so that one seems almost to have grown out of the other. His non-AIA service activities are listed on Page 7 under "Achievements in Public Service."

NOMINEE'S ACHIEVEMENT IN PUBLIC SERVICE

1. Believing that architects should be closely concerned with all matters affecting man's physical environment, Donn Emmons has long been active in groups in the San Francisco Bay Area that concern themselves with planning, urban renewal, and related matters.

He was President of the San Francisco Planning and Housing Association (now the Planning and Urban Renewal Association) from 1947 to 1949, and has continued to serve as a Director of that organization ever since. The Planning and Urban Renewal Association is a strong and influential group of civic leaders from all professions, and has had considerable effect in such issues as the preservation of open land and recreational areas within the City, the establishing of height limitation of buildings, proposing and supporting studies of public parking and transportation, supporting urban renewal projects, and other city planning matters.

Donn Emmons was appointed by the Mayor of San Francisco to serve on the San Francisco Forward Committee in 1954 and 1955 -- a Committee of Architects and Engineers formed to advise the Mayor on major building construction for the City.

In 1959, he was Chairman of a Joint Committee of Architects, Engineers, Landscape Architects and Planners -- a group that was formed so that these related professions might speak with a united voice on public matters of close mutual concern.

As General Chairman of the 1960 AIA Convention in San Francisco, Mr. Emmons placed great emphasis on the public relations aspects of the occasion. Public officials and leaders in community life were invited to many functions, and were enthusiastic in their praise. A selected segment of the public was invited to hear the major Convention speakers — a precedent-breaking move which had inestimable community relations value. The Rotunda of the City Hall was made available for the President's Reception — the first time it had been opened for a non-civic function. Architectural exhibits were prominently displayed in all of the major stores inthe downtown area, and other architectural exhibits were held in local museums and architectural schools. This Convention, largely because of Donn Emmons' leadership, had a powerful impact on the community, thus contributing to the advancement of the profession.

9 3.97 Donn Emmons

Architect Donn Emmons, whose designs ranged from redwood houses to Ghirardelli Square, died of congestive heart faiture on Monday at his Saussilto home. He would have been 67 years old on October 4.



Mr. Emmons also was part of the design team for Bank of America world headquarters and a design consultant for BART.

His career

was inseparable from his association of nearly 50 years with the famous regionalist firm of Wurster, Bernardi and Emmons. Founded in 1928 by William Wilson Wurster, who was joined in 1934 by Theodore Bernardi, the firm was already internationally known for its straightforward, unassuming use of wood and respect for natural environment when Mr. Emmons came to the office in 1938.

They formed the partnership

They formed the partnership which still bears their names after Mr. Emmons, who served for four years as a U.S. Navy gunnery officer in the Pacific, returned to San Francisco in 1945.

Although all three partners continued as active designers, Mr. Emmons was principally responsible for many of their most important commissions. They included the apartments and commercial buildings of the Golden Gateway redevelopment complex in San Francisco and the Capitol Towers project in Sacramento, the Woodlake apartment development in San Mateo, and the planning and design of the new Merritt College campus in the Oakland hills, all done in the 1860s and 1970s.

At the same time Mr. Emmons

At the same time, Mr. Emmons did many charming houses and small buildings such as the new Woodside Community Church in 1960, which has adobe walls, and the Mill Valley Public Library in 1989, which is arguably Mr. Emmons' finest accomplishment.

BART named Mr. Emmons its object in the farchitectural consultant in 1994, but he found himself embroiled in controversy when BARTs engineers failed to accept his recommendations for careful planning and design.

planning and design.

In particular, the engineers refused to recognize the system's impact on Surrounding communities. Accompanied by landscape consultant Lawrence Halprin, Mr. Emmons resigned two years later, enisiting wide public support for his position. His designs for the heroic piers of BART's elevated structures were later honored with awards by the American Institute of Architecture.

Over the years, Wurster, Bernardi and Emmons received more than 100 awards for excellence in design, and Mr. Emmons Minsell was named a fellow of the AlA in 1854 for "outstanding achievement in design."

In 1984, the AIA honored Mr. Emmons with the Albert John Evers Environmental Award. In 1984, he received a San Francisco Aris. Commission Award for "distinguished work and achievement in architecture."

He was also an advisor to the State Department's Office of Foreign Buildings, which is responsible for embassy construction around the world.

He retired from active practice 12 years ago.

Mr. Emmons was born in Olean, N.Y., in 1910. He received his architectural training at Cornell University from 1928 to 1933, and apent 1934 in architecture school at the University of Southern California. After working four years for Los Angeles firms, he moved permanently to the Bay Area in 1938.

1938.

He was married twice, in 1942 to Nancy Plerson Emmons, and in 1960 to Audrey Durland Emmons, who died April 1. He is survived by his daughters, Zette Emmons of New York and Luli Emmons Graetch of Berkoley; a son, Andrew Mush" Emmons of Mill Valley; by his brother, Prederick Emmons of Belvedere; and grandchildren, Rory and Anya Graetch.

A memorial gathering will be held on October 4, at 4 p.m. at the Saint Francis Yacht Club in San Francisco. Remembrance gifts may be made to the Mill Valley Public Library Foundation, attention Anne Montgomery, 375 Throckmorton Ave. Mill Valley 94941.
