As a result of nominee's particular attention to specifications for many years, the analysis and appropriate use of materials, their adaptation to new design and their proper detail has reached a high level of accomplishment in this office. Specifications have been streamlined and made explicit to ease the work of contractors, thereby developing accurate estimates, reducing extras, and producing the most structure for the building dollar. His attention has been directed constantly to details of design, backed by intimate knowledge of the performance of materials, their relative cost and over-all appropriateness. Specifically, he has taken a lead in developments in the use of veneer for frame and masonry construction, the use of sheet vinyl and vinyl covered fabrics for hospitals, and the use of pre-stressed concrete for highway structures.

Recently, he pointed out to the steel industry the lack of progress in the development of steel and steel fabrication since 1926. This point was made at a time when it was faced with heavy losses to pre-stressed concrete. As a result, new types of steel and steel design are appearing in the design of recent highway structures.

The nominee directed the use of pre-stressed concrete frame for the Agnes Irwin School. The use of pre-stressed members as finish surfaces achieved extensive economies, as well as effective design features and produced a good building at a price well below average school construction costs.

SERVICE TO THE INSTITUTE

Philadelphia Chapter Activities

- 1936-39 Chapter Executive Committee
- 1936-42 Committee on Education - During this period this Committee actively urged the development of Extension Courses at the University of Pennsylvania and the development of instruction in design at Drexel Institute.
- 1938-42 Implemented the "Mentor System" for assisting graduates to attain fully rounded experience for State examination.
- 1938 City Charter - Worked on City Charter Committee to establish duties and responsibilities of the office of City Architect, and to insure proper echelon in order for him to be effective.
- 1939-42 Public Relations - Active member of the Committee on Public Relations to create some system of Public Relations for Architects in the City and State. Recommended that Philadelphia Chapter take active interest in all matters pertaining to the City and the City Plan, and to express firm opinions on all questions of Public interest. Recommended and developed a "Movie" for use in crystalizing in the Public mind the need for City Planning. Personally took pictures and assembled Movie for presentation. Spoke at many group luncheons enlisting support for City Planning.
- 1940 Chairman of Committee to engage an Executive Secretary for the Chapter to develop Public Relations and coordinate Chapter Activities.
- 1941-42 Chairman, Architects Committee on Preparedness, concurrently working with Civil Defense Committee as Chief of the City's Camouflage Group. This activity was directed to evaluating camouflage techniques for Metropolitan areas, airports, industrial buildings, etc.
- 1948 Chairman Committee of Public Information - This was a continuation of previous efforts to persuade the Architects to undertake group action to better explain our services to the Public. At the same time, stressed the need for intramural activity within the Chapter in order to insure professional services of consistently high quality.
- 1949 Chairman Committee for the Unification of Building Codes in the area surrounding the City, where some forty different building codes were in effect. Some progress was attained, though the recommendation that the BOCA Code be adopted thruout could not be carried out.

SERVICE TO THE INSTITUTE

Philadelphia Chapter Activities (cont.)

- 1952-55 Chapter Executive Committee - Principal activity was to reconcile certain groups in the Chapter who were anxious to "secede" from the Pennsylvania Society of Architects. Movement stopped and real interest developed in "State" function of the Pennsylvania Society of Architects.
- 1953 Committee on Municipal Developments - Succeeded in developing endorsement for the Delaware Expressway.
- 1955 Chaired a Committee to select and recommend candidates for the position of City Architect. Three Architects expressed interest in this position, and the Committee was successful in having one of these selected by the City to fill the vacancy.
- 1961 Convention in Philadelphia - Took charge of all seating arrangements in the Academy of Music for the performance of the Philadelphia Orchestra and made all arrangements for the Buffet Ball afterward.

Pennsylvania Society of Architects

Elected to the Executive Committee to represent Philadelphia Chapter - 1952-55 - 1955-58 - 1961-63.

Zantzinger was elected to the Executive Committee of the Pennsylvania Society of Architects by the Philadelphia Chapter, at a time when the Society was emerging from its infancy. Much depended upon support from the largest sub-chapter - Philadelphia - for the success of the Society, since Philadelphia's numerical strength was important; but Philadelphians were generally unaware of the very strong support the Society could develop at the State level.

This was evidenced by the fact that a substantial element in Philadelphia wished to secede from the State Society. At this juncture Zantzinger was able to persuade dissident elements of the importance of the State function and of the importance to the Society of Philadelphia's support. An influential member of the opposition became so convinced of this point of view that he accepted nomination to the Executive Committee of the Society and ultimately was elected President.

SERVICE TO THE INSTITUTE

Pennsylvania Society of Architects (Cont.)

Executive Secretary - Public Relations

During this same period it was also evident that the Society needed expert and continuous representation in Harrisburg. Zantzinger supported the proposition that an Executive Secretary of ability would be the best asset to Architectural Public Relations in the State. He gave unqualified support to the employment of James Peifer, whose effectiveness on behalf of the Architects has been outstanding since he was employed by the Society.

Intramural Relations

Zantzinger's activities during his term of office with P.S.A. have contributed substantially to the breaking down of artificial barriers between other Chapters in the State and the Philadelphia Chapter.

P.S.A. Annual Forum

This uniquely successful annual meeting of the Pennsylvania Society of Architects has been supported and encouraged by the Nominee in the belief that such a meeting would help to develop a proper type of publicity for Architects, unify and strengthen the profession within the State, keep elected representatives informed of the profession's aims, and develop methods whereby the Architects could help the Producers Council (rather than vice versa). As evidenced by the record, most of these objectives are being attained and strengthened as Forum activities expand from year to year.

General

It would be impossible to describe in detail the hours of effort that have been given by the nominee to the work of this effective organization, but there is little doubt that his activities have contributed in no small measure to the advancement of the profession in the State of Pennsylvania.

Citizens Council on City Planning

Director 1952 - 1959

Secretary - 1959

This is a Citizens' group interested in City Planning. Activities include a Zoning Alerting Service, Development of interest in City Planning; preparing comments for City Council each year on proposals to be included in the Capital Budget; programming six public meetings a year to inform the Public on methods of City Planning; staffing and administering the Philadelphia City Planning Exhibit.

As well as the usual duties that devolve upon a "director", the nominee was a member of the Zoning Committee which submitted recommendations to the City where the Zoning Ordinance was being rewritten. He was also a member of the Committee on the Comprehensive Plan.

Notably - at the time the Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority was writing the contract with the Redeveloper for the "Old City Area" in Philadelphia, many requirements important to proper planning and design in this area were overlooked. These aspects were pointed out by Zantzinger to the Executive Board of the Citizens Council on City Planning and this group was influential in having the proper requirements included in the actual contract.

Major Advisory Committee on Penn Center - 1953 - 1959

In 1953 Mayor Clark appointed Zantzinger as one of two Architects on a Special Committee on Penn Center. Its duties were to develop Public support of the plan for Penn Center as originally proposed by the City Planning Commission. Whereas developers usually are prone to disregard advance planning concepts, this Committee successfully influenced the placing of present buildings to create open spaces, the incorporation of underground service facilities and the extension of elevator service to the concourse and the new City Office Building.

The Committee also strongly recommended that no building be erected on the block between 15th Street and Penn Square and that it be acquired by the City - a step which has now been accomplished.

PUBLIC SERVICE
SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION

Commissioner of Radnor Township - 1948-1952

As Commissioner, Zantzinger served as Chairman of the Sewer Committee, and in this capacity developed planning for watershed sewer service serving five Townships, in whole or in part. This plan, initiated at that time, is now completed. At the same time, this Committee was able to change sewer charges from a "fixture" basis to a "use" basis. This "pay-as-you-go" principle made it possible to remove the cost of sewer construction and service from the General Obligation Bonds of the Township.

Concurrently worked with the Committee which finally proposed revision of the outdated Zoning Ordinance.

Instituted an effective arrangement (subsequently discontinued) whereby speculative builders were persuaded to improve the appearance of their buildings by making improvements in drawings before building permits were granted. As an Architect, he was able to "advise" the Township Engineer on desired improvements, and the Engineer in turn, was able to persuade the developer to correct drawings before approval.

During this period as Township Commissioner, he was able to generate considerable cooperation on the part of other Townships in working toward a uniform Building Code for all Suburban Municipalities, Townships, and Boroughs. Although the expressed desire to have the BOCA Code adopted seemed impossible at that time, the movement contributed materially to the similarities that have subsequently developed in these numerous Codes.

Trustee, Fairmount Park Art Association - 1955 to date

This organization is empowered to provide sculpture and other aesthetic improvements in Fairmount Park. Sculpture is purchased and sited, fountains, etc. constructed, important existing sculpture night-lighted - for the enhancement of this beautiful Park. Specifically, the nominee is a member of the New Projects Committee, which recommended and carried out the installation of a statue of Walt Whitman at the approach to the Walt Whitman Bridge, conducted a competition, and acquired thru it, two fine pieces of new sculpture for the Philadelphia Zoo, and worked toward the acquisition of distinctive sculpture for the Azalea Garden to the west of the Philadelphia Museum of Art.

At present, a program of interest is being instituted by the nominee. Feeling that there are great possibilities in the use of plastics, an effort is on foot to establish a research program to determine to what extent plastics can be useful and permanent in executing sculpture and to what extent color can be used.

Trustee - Episcopal Hospital - 1938 to date

Zantzinger has acted over the years as the building counselor for the Board. This has included responsibility for the maintenance of buildings, some of which are over 100 years old. In recent years he has overseen the complete rewiring system, as well as the complete renovation of the Boiler Plant, Laundry and Obstetrical Department.

C. CLARK ZANTZINGER, JR.

Nominee is head of his firm, directs over-all policy and establishes criteria for orderly execution of work. Following his preliminary conferences with a client for all major projects, he establishes the program and prepares schematics to be developed in the drafting room under his personal supervision.

In the belief that good architecture should reflect careful planning and design, he insists that all final design evolve from the disciplines imposed by function, structure, mechanics, materials and budget.

Building design should be appropriate to function.

Structural systems should be analyzed to express design concepts and budget requirements.

Mechanical systems should fulfill modern requirements and be designed so that operating personnel find them workable and easy to maintain.

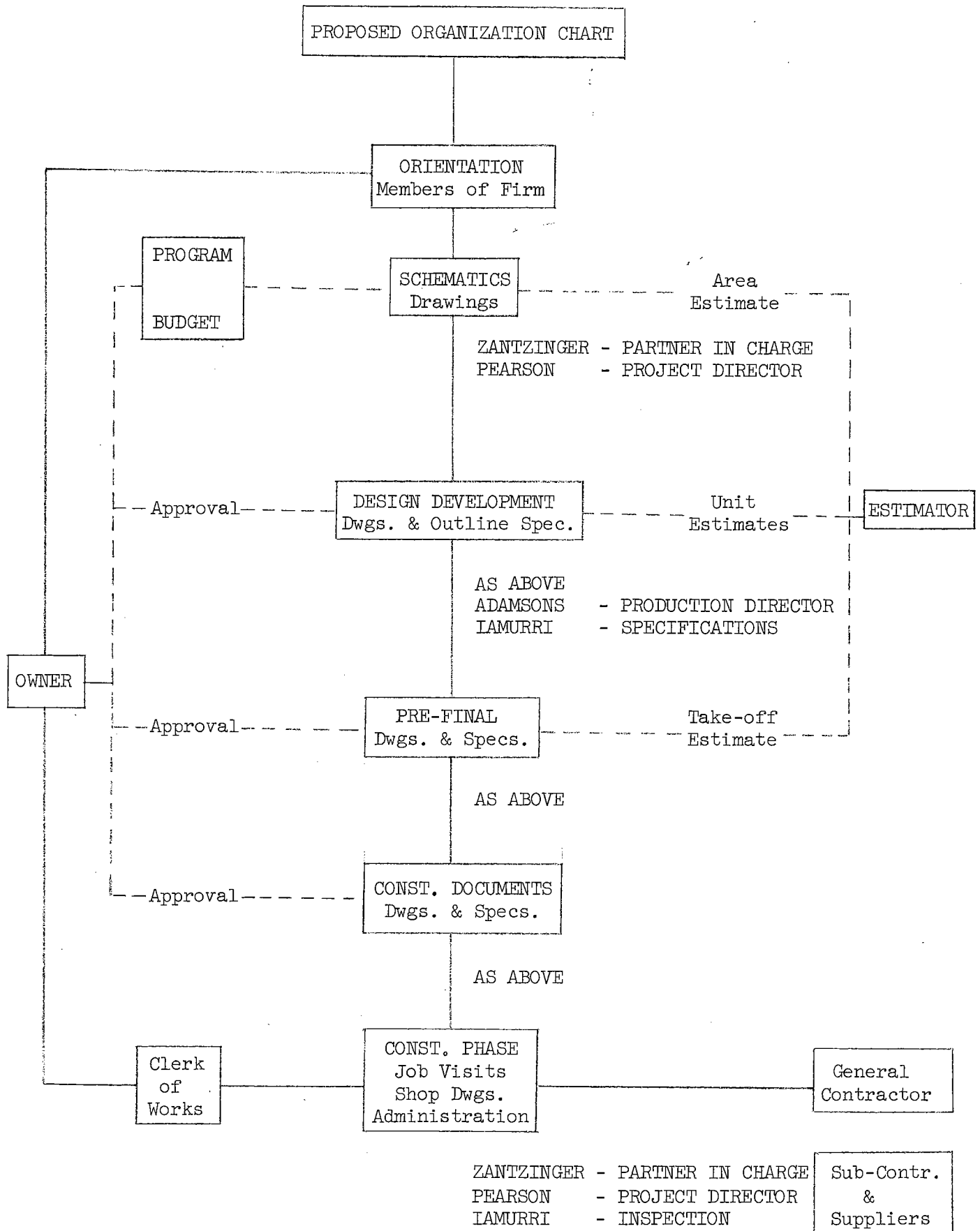
Materials should be thoroughly investigated and judiciously selected as to suitability for purpose and function.

Budget should be checked at each phase of design and the owner advised as to appropriate steps to be taken if costs are out of line.

Nominee has prepared the attached organization chart to show a flow of work thru the office.

Nominee's enthusiasm and leadership and his insistence on good design and construction have been an inspiration to the office and have generated a fine team spirit which has been of major importance in the execution and completion of difficult projects.

Regarding office policy, the nominee has directed his firm's operations and has developed office management programs for the promotion of key personnel to associate and junior partner status with profit-sharing and retirement plans. He has initiated research into insurance coverages for owners, architects, and contractors, and has directed his attention to the specifics in the General Conditions in order to reflect changes in phraseology and practice.
