Confidential Inquiry re. N.C.A.R.B. No. 745 - Ziegler

Dear Sir:

Mr. Carl A. Ziegler, an architect residing at 427 W. Mermaid Lane, Philadelphia, in applying to the National Council for a record of his training and experience, to be used for the purpose of applying for registration in states, other than his home state, has stated: That he was elected to membership in the American Institute of Architects in 1910 under the name of Charles A. Ziegler; that he was a delegate of the Department of State of the United States and The American Institute of Architects to the Fourth Pan-American Congress of Architects held in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, in June, 1930 and was made an honorary member of the Instituto Central de Architecture of Brazil; and was a delegate of The American Institute of Architects to the International Congress on Technical Education held in Barcelona, Spain in 1934, where he was placed on the Committee of Honor.

Mr. Ziegler also states that he was awarded the silver Medal at the Pan-American Exposition of Architecture in Buenos Aires in 1927; and the Gold Medal for the Persian Government Building at the Sesqui-Centennial Exposition in Philadelphia.

Will you kindly verify, for the benefit of architectural registration boards to whom his record may be sent, the statements made by Mr. Ziegler in so far as you are able to do so from your records? As is the case with all inquiries sent out concerning applicants for a Council record, the replies received are considered confidential and are used only for the purpose for which the applicant has caused the inquiries to be made.

I recently received a letter from an architect in Philadelphia calling our attention to the fact that a member of The Institute, Ernest H. Yardley, is holding himself forward as the former architect at the site for the restoration of Congress Hall in Philadelphia. Apparently the architects in Philadelphia take some exception to Mr. Yardley's so characterizing himself.

Mr. Yardley was engaged in work on Congress Hall in 1912 under the auspices and direction of the Committee on the Preservation of Historic Monuments of the Philadelphia Chapter.

I am writing to you merely to set the record straight. It is possible, however, that Mr. Yardley has acquired a title which relates him to Congress Hall and of which title the architects in Philadelphia might not be aware. I have written to you as it is reported that on the letterhead of a letter written by you to an architect in Philadelphia, Mr. Yardley's name appeared in an association to which the architects in Philadelphia do not believe he is entitled.

Sometime when you are in the neighborhood please drop in my office and we can discuss the matter further. You have not been around here for a long time.

Carl A. Ziegler, Prominent Philadelphia Architect

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 22. — Carl A. Ziegler, 75, well-known architect who designed a number of churches, banks and other buildings here and in other cities, died yesterday in his suburban Chestnut Hill home.

Mr. Ziegler also was active in restoration of Independence Hall and Carpenters Hall here, and built the First National Bank in Louisville, Ky.

Born in Philadelphia, he was graduated from the University of Pennsylvania in 1895.

CARL A. ZIEGLER, 75, ARCHITECT 50 YEARS

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 21—Carl A. Ziegler, an architect for a half century whose buildings included churches and banks, died unexpectedly today at his home in the Chestnut Hill section at the age of 75.

A past president of the Committee for the Preservation of Historic Landmarks, Mr. Ziegler aided in the restoration of Independence Hall and Carpenter's Hall in this city and Washington's headquarters and General Varnum's headquarters at Valley Forge.

In 1927 he received the "Medalia de Plata y Diploma" for his part in preparing the United States section for exhibit in Buenos Aires during the third Pan-American Congress of Architects.

Mr. Ziegler was born here and was graduated from the University of Pennsylvania. He was a member of the Royal Society of Arts of England.

Surviving are his widow, Marjorie, and two daughters, Mrs. Margaret Van Beuren and Mrs. Marilla Davenport Cox.
