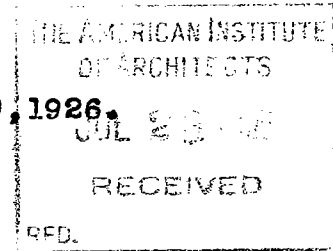

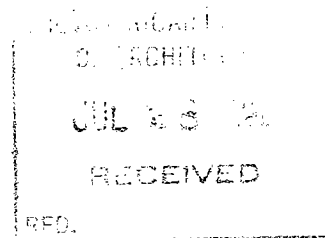

My dear Mr. Tingley:

The Florida Chapter, which covered the entire State of Florida, has been divided into three new Chapters, namely, the Florida North Chapter, the Florida Central Chapter, and the Florida South Chapter.

Under resolutions of the Board of Directors creating these new Chapters in Florida, it was directed that all members of the old Florida Chapter be transferred to the new Chapter having jurisdiction of their place of residence.

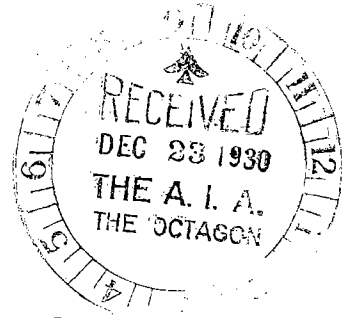





Responding to yours of December 13 at hand on the 14th, with regard to the case of Mr. Clark W. Tingley:

According to the record here he is currently registered to practice in Florida, but we have no information that he is currently registered to practice in New York.

However, The Board of The Institute has ruled that current registration in any state is sufficient to meet the requirement with respect to registration, and that an applicant registered in one state may be elected and assigned to a chapter in another state.

Therefore, Mr. Tingley's application seems to be complete, but we are quite sure that he will not be re-elected by The Institute and assigned to the Central New York Chapter unless the Chapter approves.

It would be difficult for The Board of Examiners, or The Secretary, to form an opinion on the eligibility of Mr. Tingley - apart from the record as it stands.

So, we think that the Chapter's recommendation will govern and that no further action on the application should be taken at The Octagon until your approval is received.

We are sending a copy of this letter to Regional Director Kaelber, noting in your letter that he would check to see if Mr. Tingley had made application for registration in the State of New York.

The files in the Professional Examinations Bureau indicate that Mr. Clark N. Tingley of Binghamton, New York, applied for a license to practice architecture in this State in March 1945 on the basis of a Florida license issued to him in June 1926. With his application Mr. Tingley submitted a personal affidavit which stated that prior to May 1916 he had been employed by Mr. Walter H. Whitlock, a licensed architect in this state with an office in Binghamton, and that he continued to work for Mr. Whitlock until June 1919. In June 1919 he went to work for Gibb and Waltz, Ithaca, and remained with that firm until March 1920 when he went to Washington, D. C. with Hornblower and Marshall where he remained until December 1920. Subsequent to that date he was employed with Webb, Marlow and Vought, architects in New York City, and remained with that firm until 1924 when he transferred to the office of Mr. Donn Barber. He returned to Binghamton and again became an employee of Walter H. Whitlock until 1926 when he went to Florida and obtained a license and practiced for two years, returning to Binghamton, and since 1928 has been employed by Walter H. Whitlock.

Mr. Tingley was advised, upon receipt of his application, to forward a statement from the Florida authorities of the requirements in that state which he met for the license issued to him in 1926 and verified statements of all of his architectural experience and practice. He has not submitted evidence that he has practiced ten years in Florida, nor has he submitted evidence that at the time his Florida license was issued he met in all respects other than the examination the requirements in force in this state at that time. The Florida authorities submitted a statement to the effect that at the time that Mr. Tingley secured his license it was by passing a junior examination which was the standard examination at that time.

However, Florida at that time had no academic requirement for admission to the examination. The only requirements according to the statement of the Florida Board were the filing of an application and the payment of a fee. Mr. Tingley was advised that it was not possible to secure a license under the statute.



I have received a reply to my letter of February 1st, to Walter Paul Bowen. Mr. Bowen's letter is dated February 5th. He enclosed a photostatic copy of a letter from Dr. Harry Shapiro, M. D., Vice-President, Chairman, Building Committee, Vestal Veterans' Memorial Association, Inc., which is dated September 14th, 1945. This letter advised Mr. Bowen that he had been appointed as an Architect for the proposed Memorial Community Center to be erected in Vestal.

There is no mention, whatsoever, of Mr. Tingley's name in connection with this commission. Furthermore, Mr. Bowen advised me that his association with Mr. Tingley is that of employer and employee and that Mr. Tingley does such work as delegated to him by Mr. Bowen. With respect to the newspaper article, Mr. Bowen says, "The newspaper report you mentioned was a statement by the Paper, a misprint, and was not quoted by me or Mr. Tingley."

I am returning to you, the newspaper clipping which you loaned me. I am also submitting this file to Mr. Chalres Hollender, Executive Secretary of Professional Conduct, with the recommendation that the file be marked, "closed," as I feel that it is necessary to accept Mr. Bowen's statement. However, at any time we find that Mr. Tingley is other than an employee of Mr. Bowen's and is practicing Architecture under the color of Mr. Bowen's license, that of course, would be a different story.

I enclose a copy of Article 56 of the Education Law and call your attention to the provisions of Section 1476 as well as to Section 1479A.

I am advised that you have entered into a partnership in the practice of architecture with one Clark N. Tingley. As you are aware Mr. Tingley is not licensed to practice Architecture in this State. Therefore, any contract that you undertake to render professional service must be considered a violation of statute. I refer specifically to a newspaper report concerning plans for a memorial for the Vestal Veterans Memorial Association.

I will appreciate an immediate explanation concerning your association with Mr. Tingley to submit to me an explanation concerning his practice in this state without being licensed. It might be well for him to examine Section 1480 of the Education Law.
