Dear Mr. Tubby:

Your letter of December 18th was duly received, but due to the rush of work incident to the close of the year, this is the first opportunity we have had to respond.

The Institute does not have a class of membership, at the present time, known as the membership-at-large. Such few members as we have, so designated, are those remaining from the earlier years of the Institute when such membership was permissible.

Inasmuch as you state that you are not now practising architecture, and we note that you have been a member since 1908, it has occurred to us that you may be eligible for retirement, which would relieve you from all financial obligation to the Institute (but not the Chapter, unless the Chapter takes similar action) while still retaining the privileges of full membership.
