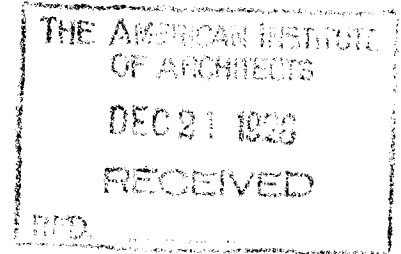

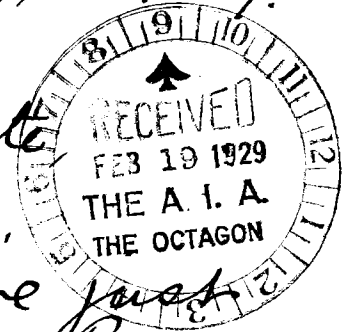

He opened his own office at 328 N. Charles St. in 1910 and practiced there until two years before his death.

He was a presbyterian, and a member of "The Committee" of the First Presbyterian Church of Baltimore, making the repairs to that old building, and its organ, his special work. In politics he was an independent. He belonged to no fraternal societies.

Other Affiliations: (Religious, Fraternal, Political, Social)

He taught French to the soldiers at Camp Meade during World War One as a physical disability kept him out of the armed forces. For a few years following the War, he became one of the teachers of French at the U.S. Naval Academy at Annapolis.

He published a few architectural articles in magazines but I regret that I cannot remember when or where.

General Background: (Personal Characteristics and Accomplishments; Interests, Digressions, Travels, Friendships, Side-lights, Honors, and Awards.)

As a young man, Mr. Turnbull's great interests were music, especially the organ and cello, the study of languages, particularly French, and his chosen profession of architecture, and they remained so throughout his life. He spent more and more time on French as he grew older, and his knowledge of the language brought him many interesting contacts in his travels in Europe and the many months he spent in Paris from time to time. He was a man of genuinely simple tastes, warm friendships, unselfishness, and generosity.

First Presbyterian Church at Govanstown (enlarged since his death)
A Public School in Baltimore (I cannot remember its name or location).
Private homes mostly in the Roland Park - Guilford regions, and in Baltimore County. Alterations to old house which was something that interested him greatly. He moved the Stemmers Run house to its present site on Caves Road for Mrs. Austin McLanahan, and worked on "~~XXXXXXXXXX~~" "Sweet Air" for Dr. Ronald Abercrombie. "Marshmont" belonging to Mr. and Mrs. J. Heade Matthews on the Dulany Valley Road, and the earliest house on the Hampton Estate to which Mr. & Mrs. John Ridgely moved after the sale of "Hampton". The house he built in Kerneway for Mrs. & Mrs. Edward Guest Gibson was developed from a stone stable already there.
