Dear Mr. Turnock:-

It was with regret that the Treasurer had to report to the Officers and Directors of the Institute at their last meeting a large amount still in default covering payment of dues for the current year.

The Directors discussed the matter seriously as the money is needed to meet the balance of our obligations for the year and moreover it seemed to them not quite fair that members who have paid their dues are not only meeting their own obligations, but assisting to pay the cash expense necessary to supply the Journal, etc., to those members who have not paid their dues. The Directors passed the following resolution:

Resolved, that those members now delinquent for more than one year be given until February 1, 1925, to make payment in whole, or to reach some agreement with the Treasurer as to future payments. Otherwise the Institute and Chapter membership of each delinquent coming under this resolution shall be terminated on March 1, 1925, upon notice to him from the Secretary to that effect.

I am sending you this as an appeal to make a remittance to the Treasurer of \$40.00, including the dues for 1924, which, as you know, were payable eleven months ago.

I trust that you will write me promptly and also frankly if for any reason you cannot pay all or any part of the amount at the present moment.

ELKHART ARCHITECT DIES

**Enoch Hill Turnock Once President
of Indiana Association.**

[Special to The Indianapolis News]
FT. WAYNE, Ind., July 9.—
Enoch Hill Turnock, age seventy,
former president of the Indiana
State Association of Architects, died
here late Thursday, the former home
of Mrs. Turnock. They left their
home at Elkhart nine months ago,
Mr. Turnock undergoing treatment
and an operation at Rochester, Minn.
Complication developed when the
patient was removed here two
months ago.

Mr. Turnock was born in England,
the son of a carpenter and joiner,
who brought his family to Elkhart
fifty-five years ago. The son re-
turned to Elkhart in 1907, after
spending thirty-seven years in Chi-
cago and was commissioned to de-
sign most of the principal municipal,
semi-public and industrial
buildings erected in this city since
that time. He recently was elected
to fellowship in the American In-
stitute of Architecture.

He was a member of various Ma-
sonic orders and of the Presbyterian
church.

Llewellyn Turnock, of Indiana-
polis, is a son. There are three
other sons and two daughters, chil-
dren of two former marriages. The
burial probably will be at Ft.
Wayne.

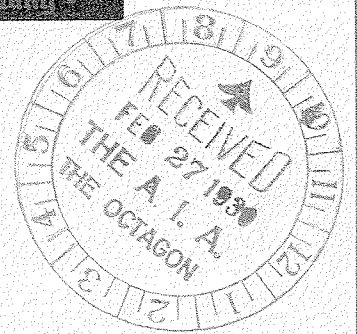
