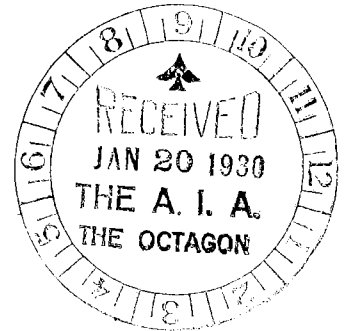

On every Wednesday afternoon, starting November 27th, from 2 to 5 vocational analyses will be made by Mr. R. G. Bell, Prof. T. F. Ball and Prof. R. L. Sumwalt. This is simply an analysis of one's abilities and main drives in life. The interest drives will be divided into the following category:
