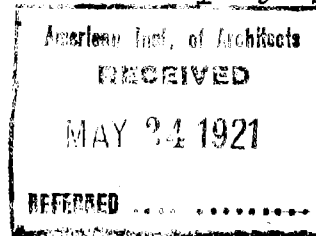

Dear Mr. Wood:

We are indeed sorry to receive your letter of January 18th, tendering your resignation as a member of The American Institute of Architects.

The Officers and Directors will be sorry to lose your support of the profession and the Institute in its work.

In order to comply with the By-law requirements, in the submission of resignations, we wish to call to your attention the marked excerpt from the By-laws attached, from which you will note that a resignation should come forward through the Secretary or Treasurer of the Chapter to which you are assigned, with the endorsement of the Chapter thereon.

As you know, the annual dues for 1931 would also have to be paid before a resignation could be accepted, as you will note from the excerpt of the By-laws attached.

However, the Board, at its November meeting, authorized the Secretary to carry into 1932 those members who are not indebted, except for the year 1931. Therefore, no action would be taken adversely affecting your membership without ample notice at the end of 1932.

We hope very much that business will improve before the close of the year and that you can then send a check covering dues for at least 1931.

The Institute is greatly concerned at the prospective loss of good members who have encountered financial difficulties. It has been carrying those members for at least two years, and inasmuch as your dues are paid to December 31, 1930, the sincere hope is expressed that you will allow your membership to continue during 1932. By that time things may be much brighter.

Dear Mr. Wood:

Your letter of December 2nd reached me at a bad time for I had a touch of the flu that I understand came from your Islands and was away from my work for a couple of weeks. (See 1941)

I was glad to hear from you and I am at my wits' end how I can help you. It seems to me it would have been particularly fitting for the Army and Navy to have requested the help of the profession in projects so far from continental U.S.A. But as near as I can find out, they made no exceptions to their general policy of doing everything they could themselves by using their shopworn plans and letting construction contracts immediately, leaving the adaptations of the plans in some cases to the contractors themselves, in others to engineers. Under the stress of emergency it seems to me they are not recognizing that the planning and grouping that was done in 1917 is not appropriate for and cannot be adequately protected against the kind of warfare that now obtains.

I do not know what more we could have done down here. It hasn't been a personal job because I have had the continual assistance of the Executive Committee of The Institute, of half a dozen members who have volunteered to help and the benefit of joint actions with the Civil Engineering Society and the Association of Landscape Architects.

I am sure our efforts have been helpful. The architects have succeeded in obtaining recognition in many instances that I am sure they would not have had an opening except for what the profession has done. Nothing has been wasted and there is a big program ahead which we are going to do everything we can to induce the Federal

Departments to permit the architects in private practice to participate in the defense program to the extent of their capabilities.

The condition is particularly aggravating in the housing work for the experience of the 400-odd architects in housing matters during the last four years has not been used at all.

I have tried to cover the situations in my messages. I do not know or not you have received the October and November ones, for those issues of THE OCTAGON were late. The December number should come out within the week.

There is little I can add to what I say in those messages. Perhaps you will find another note in the article I am sending to the ARCHITECTURAL RECORD for its January issue.

Please write me any suggestions you have of things that we have left undone or things that we can do in the immediate future for the enlarged program.
