

### F. A. WRIGHT FUNERAL HELD

Summit Man, 94, Helped as Architect to Develop Short Hills Area.

SUMMIT- Rev. Dr. Jacob Trapp, pastor of the Community (Unitarian) Church, conducted funeral services today for Frank Ayers Wright of 45 Linden place, retired, New York architect. Mr. Wright died Saturday after a long illness in Riverview Nursing Home, Whippany. Burial was in Rosedale Cemetery, Orange.

Mr. Wright, who was 94, was one of the developers and architects of the Brantwood section of Short Hills. He studied architecture at Cornell University. In 1879 he received his degree. The oldest member of the Cornell Club of New York, he was a member of the American Institute of Architecture. He was author of "Architectural Perspective for Beginners" and founder of the Architectural League of New York.

From 1910 to 1912 Mr. Wright was one of the leading amateur golfers in the country. He won the Cornell Club championship 13 times and was an honorary member of the Baltusrol Golf Club.

Mr. Wright came to Summit from Short Hills in 1928. He was a member of the Old Guard.  $H_{\rm e}$  was the widower of Mrs.Elizabeth Hanford Wright.

He leaves three daughters, Mrs. H. A. Poillon of New York, Mrs. C. A. Slosson of Greenwich, Conn. and Mrs. Lyman Middleditch of Monmouth Hills; eight grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren.

# FRANK A. WRIGHT, AN ARCHITECT, 94

Oldest Member of Cornell Club of New York Dies—Former Senior Golf Champion

Frank Ayers Wright of 45 Linden Place, Summit, N. J., a retired architect and oldest living member of the Cornell Club of New York, died on Saturday at the Riverview West Nursing Home in Whippany, N. J., after a long illness. His age was 94.

Mr. Wright, a founder of the Architectural League of New York, had been a partner in the architectural firm of Rossiter & Wright of New York. He was developer and architect of the Brantwood area of Short Hills, N. J.

Born in Liberty, Sullivan County, N. Y., a son of A. B. and M. J. Wright, he was graduated from Cornell in 1879. He had served as an instructor in architecture at Cornell and was author of "Architectural Perspective for Beginners," 1882, a widely used textbook.

Mr. Wright was a former senior golf champion of the United States and held the golf championship of the Cornell Club thirteen times.

A former trustee of South Orange, N. J., he was a member of the American Institute of Architecture, an honorary life member of the Cornell Club and the Baltusrol Golf Club, a charter member of Canoe Brook Country Club and a member of Sigma Upsilon and the Old Guard of Summit.

Mr. Wright had been active in the New England Society, the Orange (N. J.) Architectural League, the National Arts Club and the Waterwitch Club. He was the author also of "Modern House Painting," 1880.

His wife, the former Elizabeth Hanford, died in 1934. Surviving are three daughters, Mrs. Lyman Middleditch of Monmouth Hills, N. J.; Mrs. H. A. Poillon of New York and Mrs. C. A. Slosson of Greenwich, Conn. A. son, Ehrich Wright, died in 1946.
