



Dear Mr. President:

In the deliberations of the New York Chapter Fellows Committee there was unanimous agreement as to the high caliber of design exhibited in the work of Toro-Ferrer, Architects, of Santurce, Puerto Rico; and the chairman was instructed to contact Mr. Toro with a view to obtaining examples of design work executed primarily under his direction. In discussions with Mr. Toro, he strongly stated that all of the work to which he could refer resulted from a sensitive and extremely clost design collaboration between him and his partner and that, ethically, one should not be separated from the other.

This brought into discussion the increasing tendency toward close knit design partnerships which the committee feels should be recognized by the College of Fellows. In the course of these deliberations, the affiliation of the Puerto Rican members changed from the New York Chapter to a newly established Puerto Rican Chapter. It is recommended therefore that the New York Chapter write to the Puerto Rican Chapter indicating their support for joint submission of the names of Miguel Ferrer Rincon and Osvaldo L. Toro for elevation to Fellowship in Design with consideration to be based on both or neither.

On behalf of Mr. Rankin, this is in response to your letter dated May 26, in connection with the proposed Feleowship nominations of Mr. Toro and Mr. Ferrer from Puerto Rico.

Nominations may, of course, be submitted for both members when they are eligible to be nominated. It should be noted, however, that each nomination must be made on separate forms and each will be voted upon separately.

The Institute is composed of "individual" corporate members, grouped into several classes, including fellows. There are no provisions in the Bylaws for partnership or dual memberships and/or fellowships.

Aside from the above, I find that Mr. Torro and Mr. Ferrer are not quite eligible for nomination yet. Both were elected to corporate membership on October 15, 1956, and will not complete ten years of Institute membership until October 15, 1966, fifteen days after the deadline for receiving nominations.

Mr. Toro has contributed much to the development of tropical architecture in the Caribbean. The work of Toro and Ferrer on the Caribe Hilton Hotel is a fine example of careful integration of outdoor and indoor spaces and the masterful handling of circulation

In the development of prototype health centers for the Department of Public Works, Mr. Toro has contributed to improving design quality on public buildings financed on a very low budget.

The office buildings for the Legislature, which are actual additions to the old Capitol building, were handled with great design skill. The problem of integrating the two new office wings with a pseudo-classical structure was met without compromise and yet the scale and relationship of the old and new is preserved. The result is a very satisfactory solution to a design problem that is frequently mishandled. The interior patios and circulation spaces introduced into these buildings lend great charm and human scale to an office environment that is ordinarily drab.

Mr. Toro and Mr. Ferrer, of the firm of Toro and Ferrer, work in close collaboration on the design of all projects undertaken by their office.





WASHINGTON D. C., April 23 -- Two Puerto Rican architects are among 82 architects in the nation advanced to Fellowship in The American Institute of Architects. The AIA announced 1967 recipients of the lifetime honor today.

Aside from the Gold Medal, which may be presented to a single architect from any part of the world, Fellowship is the highest honor the Institute can bestow on its members.

The Puerto Rican residents are Miguel Ferrer Rincon of 8 Condado, Santurce, and Osvaldo Luis Toro of 2004 McLeary, Santurce, partners in the firm Toro-Ferrer. Both architects were elevated to Fellowship for significant contribution to the profession through design.

The S2 new Fellows bring the number of Institute members using the letters FAIA after their names to 762. Only three Puerto Ricans hold the honor.

Investiture of the new Fellows will take place at the annual banquet and ball Thursday, May 18, climaxing the 99th annual convention of the Institute to be held in New York City beginning May 14.

Ferrer, 52, was born in San Juan, where he went to Central High School. He received his Bachelor of Architecture degree from Cornell University in Ithaca, N. Y.

Toro, 52, was born in Ponce and studied in New York City, receiving his Bachelor of Architecture degree from Columbia University there.

The two architects, who work in close collaboration on the design of all projects undertaken by their office, became members of the AIA

in 1956. The Caribe Hilton Hotel in San Juan, which they designed more than 17 years ago, has served as a standard for tropical hotel architecture ever since it was completed in 1949.

Their firm has completed designs for many other hotels, including the Dorado Beach Hotel, the Puerto Rico Sheraton Hotel, the Hotel Mayaguez Hilton and the Excelsior Hotel. In addition, the firm acted as a consultant for the designs of the Tel-Aviv Hilton and the proposed Hilton Hotel in Barcelona.

Ferrer and Toro have also designed office buildings, department stores and private homes. They received a Silver Medal at the Seventh Pan American Architectural Congress in 1950 and were awarded the Instituto de Arquitectos de Puerto Rico Merit Gold Medal in 1959.

Both architects received honors from their respective architecture schools. Ferrer was invited to act as visiting critic at Cornell's School of Architecture 1965, and Toro was given the Columbia Architectural Alumni Association President's Award in 1964.
