## HARRY TROST

On September 19 last, Henry C. Trost died at his home in El Paso, Texas, at the age of seventy-three.

An editorial in the El Paso Times said; "Through the death of Henry C. Trost, the southwest loses one of its foremost citizens and builders, one who let himself be known by his works rather than by his words, one who made a valid and lasting contribution to the development of this great region. An architect of eminent quality, his monument will not be a headstone in a cemetery, but the buildings which he designed and which men find useful.—His was a life of purpose and achievement, and he leaves the southwest the richer for his having lived and worked in it."

A member of the American Institute of Architects for many years, the firm of Trost and Trost designed numerous large buildings in El Paso, in addition to an impressive list of important structures in Tacson, Phoenix, Albuquerque, Santa Fe, and Chihuahua City, Mexico.

During the building of the Chicago Fair of '93, I first met Harry Trost. One of the charter members of the Chicago Architectural Sketch Club, he was the life of every gathering, an outstanding personality. We all loved him. Quiet, kindly, sympathetic, with a geniality that warmed the cockles of one's heart, he will always remain a fragrant memory to a lonely young draughtsman a thousand miles from home. It was due to his example and philosophy of life that I learned from him more than from any other source to understand and appreciate the significance and untrammeled spirit of the west. That he made an honored name for himself in El Paso where the best and most fruitful years of his life were lived, was only the expectation of his early friends. From one who had the privilege of his friendship in '93, this sincere tribute is offered.
