RICHARD W. TROTT, A.I.A.

Nominee, as design partner in sixteen year old firm, has maintained a consistent standard of high quality architectural design which has been recognized by seventeen design awards (13 from juried programs, 4 from civic programs). Work of the firm has been published eighteen times.

Nominee has pioneered a movement of architectural re-definition of aging strip type commercial centers which heretofore were devoid of architectural merit. In addition to receiving design awards for this work, the nominee has been a leading advocate and resource speaker on old center recycling at "colleges" sponsored by the International Council of Shopping Centers in Dallas, Texas, Toronto, Canada, and Columbus, Ohio, and through them has co-authored a copy-righted paper on the renovation of small shopping centers.

Nominee has served as design juror for the Ohio Pre-Stress Concrete Awards program in 1975 and as a design juror for the Cincinnati, Ohio Chapter of the American Institute of Architects Honor Award program in 1977.

Making a major public contribution in land use determination and policy, nominee served for five years as a member of the Upper Arlington City Planning Commission, one year as Vice-Chairman and two years as Chairman. During that time, he led the Commission through the resolution of the City's most controversial land use issues, helped in the passage of a proto-type graphic control ordinance, and established a direct follow through reporting liaison system with the elected City Council. Nominee represented the City as a member of the Citizen Advisory Council of the Mid Ohio Regional Planning Commission, and served as a team leader in a public "advocacy" planning effort of the controversial "Reed/Henderson" corridor in Columbus, Ohio.

Nominee serves as member of the Columbus, Ohio Chamber of Commerce Land Use Committee which monitors legislation and activities regarding land use policy and activities and served as a speaker at a special seminar on land use sponsored by the Chamber.

In a continuing effort to bridge the gap between practice and Ohio's largest architectural school, nominee, has served as a resource speaker and as a design juror on numerous student juries at The Ohio State University, served on the University's Search Committee for a new Dean for the School of Architecture and is currently Co-Chairman of the Alumni Advisory Board to The Ohio State University School of Architecture and serves as a member of the College's Committee for Tomorrow.



He is a well-rounded person and is active in his community. He has a strong dedication to education and gives freely of his time to students. His integrity is unquestioned.



Consistent and thorough development of notable design concepts and detail in wide range of projects, predominately in developer initiated projects.

Persistent effort in high quality architectural recycling of aged strip centers. Recognition of this as a major design horizon, not only for the architectural redefinition but for the urban rebirth it gives to declining commercial corridors so common in all cities; represents a major contribution which has established nominee as one of the leading advocates of old center recycling.

Consistent skill in use of simple building materials and systems.

Consistent sensitivity to site imperatives. The several projects at Seabrook Island are notable for their acknowledgement and preservation of the fragile island ecology.

2. Describe the specific achievements of the nominee which have contributed notably to the advancement of the profession in the field of public service by his service listed above:

As advocate for rational and planned land use, nominee served on and chaired city planning commission in professional and objective manner through difficult city growth period involving controversial land use issues, guiding land use determination on the city's expanding fringe and dealing with urban design sensitivity on the "in fill" land use issues in the existing developed areas.

He helped review and pass Graphic Control Ordinance in 1971, first of its kind in the metropolitan area, and one which has successfully withstood court tests and has resulted in a noticeably controlled application of graphics throughout the city.

Nominee established direct reporting system of planning commission in public hearings of City Council which made possible a follow through on planning efforts which had not existed before.

Nominee continued to represent city planning interest as city's representative to the Citizens Advisory Committee for the Mid Ohio Regional Planning Commission and in public advocacy planning effort for the Reed/Henderson Corridor which runs between two cities, nominee served as key leader for establishment of use "linkages".

As design professional, represented Chamber of Commerce as land use speaker encouraging rational treatment of land use and promoted recognition of urban design goals in land use determination and relationships.

Nominee has consistently volunteered effort to Ohio State University in interest of maintaining liaison between practice and the college and in an effort to build a strong and more influential School of Architecture.

Received formal public commendation from Upper Arlington Planning Commission for exemplary service.

Was formally honored by City Council of City of Upper Arlington, on March 3, 1976 for service "with distinction", for "unique ability to lead" as vice chairman and chairman, and for maintaining "the highest professional standards while dealing with the intricate problems associated with the urban planning process" as chairman of the City Planning Commission.
