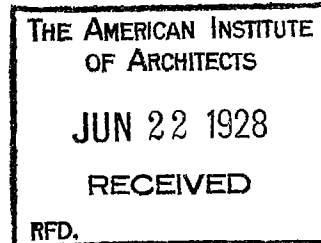

Dear Mr. Virrick:-

Permit me to acknowledge with gratification, and on behalf of the Secretary, your application for membership in The American Institute of Architects.

The application is complete except for a balance of \$20.00 due on the Initiation Fee, and the Annual Dues of \$25.00 which, for the new member, are payable in advance.

The Initiation Fee heretofore was \$5.00, but was increased to \$25.00, effective January 1, 1928.

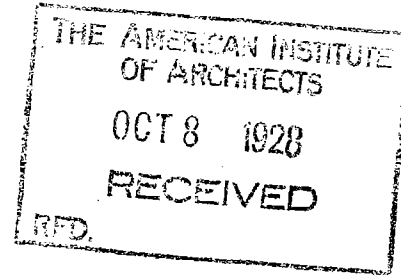

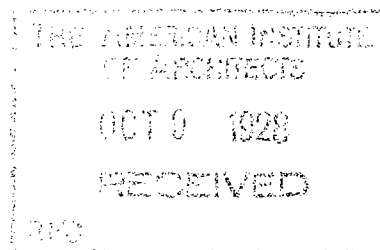

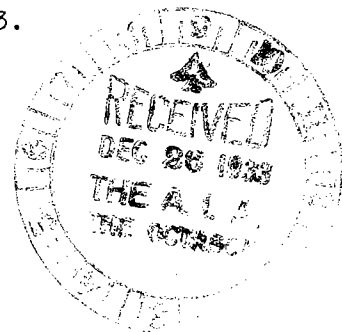

will be employed for this type of work in this district.

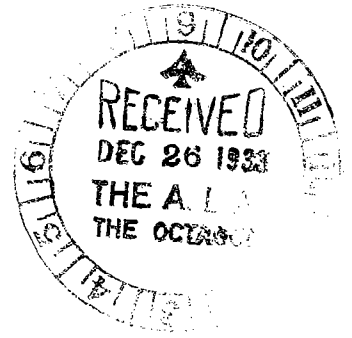

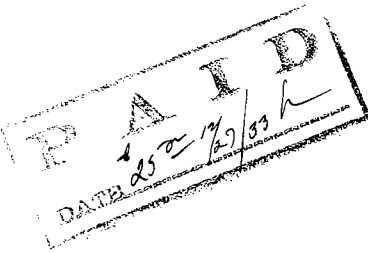


