I have received with regret your letter of November 19th. We certainly do not like to think of losing you as a member of the Institute.

I have checked up on the regulations and find that in order to put this thing thru properly, you should send your resignation to the Institute not your resignation from the Chapter to me, as Secretary of the Chapter. After a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Chapter, it is then forwarded to Washington for action by the Institute.

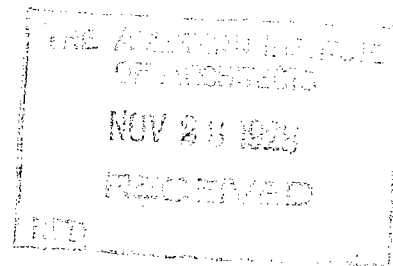

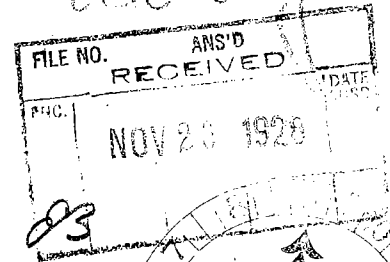

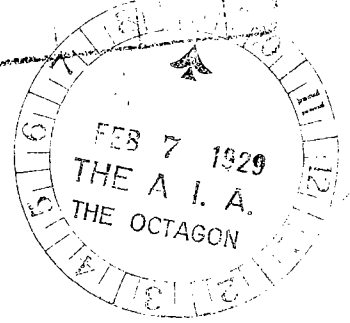

The Secretary was requested to forward the resignation to the Secretary of the Institute.

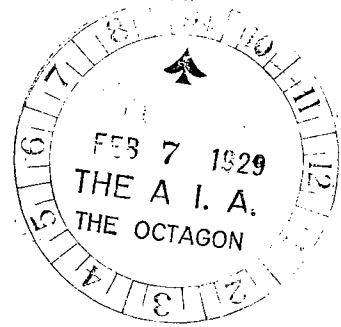
The Executive Committee has not been able after investigation to determine any reason for Mr. Vosbury's resignation.
