In connection with my experience, I have worked with such men as Donn Barber, Carrere and Hastings and McKim Mead and White during my New York experience of 10 years.


My individual practice started while I was in Vancouver about 1911, where I did the Terminal City Club, the Rex Theater and numerous large residences and apartment buildings. While in Vancouver I was an associate member of the Architectural Society.

Leaving Vancouver in 1916, I did no further architectural work until after the close of the war, when I opened up my office for practice in Washington. Since that date, namely spring of 1919, my work is more or less well known in and around Washington, and has now spread to a large number of cities throughout the country.

I am submitting herewith photographs and drawings of the Congressional Country Club and the Chastleton Apartment-Hotel, as I imagined both of these buildings are best known among my work to the local chapter.

I am executing at the present time seven buildings amounting to about twelve million dollars worth of work in all. They are as follows: the Boulevard Apartment Building in Washington, D. C.; Huntington Hall Apartment Building and Forty-third and Locust Street Apartment-Hotel in Philadelphia, Pa.; Fifth Avenue Apartment-Hotel and Law and Finance Office Building in Pittsburgh, Pa; Cherokee Apartment-Hotel in Louisville, Kentucky; and Cleveland Hall Apartment-Hotel in Buffalo, New York.

Philip M. Jullien Dies; Architect and Teacher

Philip M. Jullien, 88, a noted Washington architect, died of a heart attack Thursday at his home in Palm Beach, Fla.

Mr. Jullien, a native of Washington, designed the Congressional Country Club, the Chastleton Hotel, the Bowen Building and the Kenmore Apartments.

"He wasn't always following the pattern of the times," Leon Chatelain, a former president of the American Institute of Architects, said yesterday. "He was a leader, you might say."

Among the designs considered ahead of time and turned down by Congress was his proposal in the late 1940s for a D. C. stadium. Mr. Jullien envisioned an all-weather sports arena for Washington, with a roof supported by jetair streams, and with complete underground parking.

Taught at CU

During the late 1920s and the early 1930s he taught advanced architecture students at Catholic University.

As a teen-ager, Mr. Jullien set out to join the great gold rush in Alaska in 1897. Arriving alone, he joined several other prospectors and traveled by snowshoe and canoe across the Yukon in his unsuccessful venture for gold.

Mr. Jullien attributed most of his professional success to the perseverance and stamina he acquired in the Chillicoot Pass and Klondike wilds for two years.

In 1905 he married Mary Halbert Page, who died in 1947. Later he wed Mrs. Nancy Nast Hall, sister of the late Vogue publisher Conde Nast.

Member of Clubs

In addition to his Washington buildings, Mr. Jullien designed many hotels, office buildings and industrial plants

in Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Buffalo, New York, Atlantic City and Macon.

He was a member of the Metropolitan Washington Board of Trade, the Washington Building Congress, the Congressional Country Club, the old Raquet Club, the Lake Placid Club and the Chamber of Commerce of West Palm Beach.

Besides his wife, of Palm Beach, Mrs. Jullien leaves a son, Philip M., jr., of 912 South Quincy street, Arlington; a daughter, Mrs. Mary Page Krauthoff, of Louisville, Ky.; two brothers, Louis S., of the Westchester Apartments, and Paul, of Waterville, Me.; three sisters, Mrs. W. D. Lundy, of 2639 Garfield street N.W., Mrs. Barnett D. Phillips, of New York, and Miss Edna Jullien, of Delano, Calif.; eight grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Philip M. Jullien Sr., architect of such well-known Washington buildings as the Congressional Country Club, Chastleton Hotel, Bowen Building and Kenmore Apartments, died of cancer Thursday at his West Palm Beach, Fla., home. He was 88.

During a 60 year career he designed office buildings, hotels and industrial plants throughout the United States and Canada.



His contributions earned him an emeritus membership in the American Institute of Architects. He also belonged to the Washington Board

Ten years ago Mr. Jullien retired to Florida. Before leaving here he taught architecture at Catholic University.

In 1897 he interrupted his education to join the gold rush to the Klondike. Although he never found riches in his two years there, he often attributed his later success to the perseverance and stamina he acquired while living in the wilds.

He is survived by his wife, Nancy, who he married after the death of his first wife; a son Philip M. Jr. of 9125 South Quincy st., Arlington; a daughter Mary P. Krauthoff of Louisville, Ky.; two brothers, Louis S. of Westchester Apartments, Washington and Paul of Waterville, Maine; and three sisters, Mrs. W. D. Lundy of 2639 Garfield st. nw., Mrs. Barnett D. Phil of New York City and Edna Edna Jullien of Delano, Calif.
