A member, by virtue of his membership in The Institute, becomes a member of the chapter of The Institute within the territory of which he resides or has his place of business, as he elects, but he pays an admission fee to The Institute only. The admission fee to membership in The Institute normally is twenty-five dollars. (For 1936 this fee was reduced to five dollars.)

A member pays annual dues both to The Institute and to the chapter. The annual dues to The Institute normally are twenty-five dollars (for 1936 Institute dues were reduced to twenty dollars) and those to the chapter are fixed in its by-laws.

Normally the period between the time of filing

an application and the time it is acted on by The Board of The Institute is four months. The period will be longer if the application must be returned to the applicant for corrections or if additional exhibits of the applicant's work are required by The Board of Examiners.

Dear Mr. Neild:

As you know, in 1936 there was considerable correspondence between your office and The Octagon concerning the status of Mr. Seymour Van Os who is acting as Secretary of the North Louisiana Chapter.







W.B. Wiener Sr.

Few individuals contribute more to the shape, tone and feel of a city than a leading architect. His ideas, his concerns and his personality become buildings, and his buildings, in turn, become part of public life, profoundly affecting the way people feel about themselves, their work and their city. William B. Wiener Sr. was a citizen of Shreveport for all his 73 years and one of its leading architects for half of this century. His work, a reflection of his own life, has strongly influenced thousands of people, whether they knew him or not.

Had they known him, people would have found Mr. Wiener a man of this city as well as a man of the world. He was active in civic, cultural, business and religious affairs locally in addition to professional architectural work which took him to national and international circles. He believed fervently in the value of getting involved, staying involved and always striving for excellence — whether it was almost 60 years ago when he became the first Louisiana high school athlete to run the 100-yard dash in ten seconds, or more recently when he brought design innovations to such things as Shreveport Regional Airport and the LSU Medical Center.

Mr. Wiener's life on earth has ended, but his legacies have not. Through the buildings that surround us, serve us and affect us, the life of William B. Wiener Sr. remains and will remain very much a part of Shreveport.

William B. Wiener, 74, prominent Shreveport architect and civic leader, died Tuesday night at Doctor's Hospital.

Mr. Wiener, an architect for the past half century, was founder and senior partner of the architectural firm Wiener, Hill, Morgan, O'Neal and Sutton. He was a member of the American

Institute of Architects and was named a fellow in 1960 for design achievements. He had been president of the Shreveport chapter of the American Institute of Architects and of the Louisiana Architects Association, and he had been chairman of the National Honor Awards Committee and panel member of the Jury of Fellows for the professional

organization. Among the buildings he designed are Shreveport Regional Airport, LSU Medical School, several wings of Doctor's Hospital, several schools, including J.S. Clarke Junior High School, B'Nai Zion Temple, Commercial National Bank branch offices and Uptown Shopping Center.

SHREVEPORT
William B. Wiener, Sr., prominent local architect, died at Doctors' Hospital, Shreveport, Louisiana, at approximately 11:30 p.m. on Tuesday, January 6, 1981, following a sudden illness at his residence. He was 73 years old.

Mr. Wiener was born in Shreveport on December 4, 1907. He attended local schools and graduated from Shreveport High School where he had been a member of the football, track and swimming teams, having been the first Louisiana high school student to run the 100 yard dash in ten seconds.

He received a Bachelor of Science degree in architecture from the University of Michigan and pursued architectural study in Europe and at Columbia University as a post-graduate student. He practiced architecture continuously from the past fifty years and was founder and senior partner of Wiener, Hill, Morgan, O'Neal and Sullivan, Architects, of Shreveport, and Lufkin, Texas. He was a member of the American Institute of Architects, past President of the Shreveport Chapter, AIA, Past President of the Louisiana Architects Association, and former Chairman of the National Honor Awards Committee. In 1960 he was elevated to Fellowship in the AIA for his achievements in design. He has since served as a member of the Jury of Fellows, and a Director and member of the Council of the Gulf States Region, AIA. He received numerous awards and recognition for his architectural works, many of which were included in architectural publications in the United States and in

In addition to his professional work, Mr. Wiener was involved in numerous civic and business activities. He had served as a member of the Civic Affairs Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, the Shreveport Beautification Foundation, and The United Way. At the time of his death, he was a member of the Board of Directors of Angellina and Naches River Railroad, and Land-O-Pine Dairies, Inc., and had previously served on the Board of Directors of Angellina County Lumber Company and Doctors' Hospital. He was a member of B'Nai Zion Congregation, the Shreveport Club, and the Shreveport Country Club.

Mr. Wiener is survived by his wife, the former Babette Levy, a son, William B. Wiener, Jr., a daughter, Karen Weiner Freyer, three granddaughters, Almee Freyer, Lee Freyer and Carol Freyer, and a brother, Jacques L. Wiener, all of Shreveport. He was preceded in death by two other brothers, Earl L. Wiener, and Samuel G. Wiener, and by his parents.

Funeral services will be held at 2:00 p. m. on Thursday, January 8, 1981, at the Marshall Street Chapel of Rose-Neath Funeral Home, Rabbi Richard Zionists of B'Nai Zion Congregation officiating. Interment following at Greenwood Cemetery, Stoner Avenue, Shreveport. Pallbearers will be Dr. Marion D. Harurove, Jr., Simon Herold, Ben Levy, Jr., Dan A. Miller, Jesse O. Morgan, Jr., P. Murfl O'Neal, Jr., and Phillip F. Rosenblath, Sr. of Shreveport, and Benjamin M. E. Smith of Lufkin, Texas.
