



2. Describe nominee's notable work in design, to bring out the particular achievements the nominators believe have notably contributed to the advancement of the profession.

In all cases the problem of design has been considered as a problem in creation to tell the story of material construction and spirit of today in the language of the Architect as an artist and craftsman. The effort was made to obtain the spirit of style modified to comply with the spirit of today. To obtain originality and individuality and to avoid the usual and the commonplace, when and where the opportunity offered new forms of design and of detail were designed for the use of modern materials and modern forms of construction and the effort made to give these beauty of form and proportion. This applies more especially to the industrial type of architectural design developed by Albert Kahn and the applicant and first exemplified in the Ford Motor Plant, Highland Park, Michigan. The Ford Sales Building, Broadway, New York, was possibly the first building in New York to be designed in the modern spirit now used generally. The use of detail was regarded as an essential element of design and as a test of the designers skill in telling the story of today to meet this condition much thought and study was used to evolve new types of design in detail which would harmonise with present day conditions in material, in construction, and in expressing our present day form of culture and civilization. An illustration of the applicant's valuation of detail in design might be cited as the Doorway Entrance to the Administration Building of the Hudson Motor Plant. It has been the applicants opinion that an architectural designer must be versatile and capable in all styles and in his work has endeavored to meet this test, in the Gothic field, the classic field, and the modern field, and to do this without reproducing the work of other minds he has tired to add some contribution of his own.

The above mentioned plant designed by Albert Kahn and Ernest Wilby was the first of its kind. In it the concrete pier and steel sash were combined to produce the industrial type of building now universally used. This building is described and commented on in American Architecture by Fiske Kimball as a definite contribution to American Architecture.

A number of minor inovations now used in the industrial building have been added since 1910 by Albert Kahn and Ernest Wilby in colaboration.

It is to be noted that while the first purpose of the above mentioned constructive features was material and practical an attempt was made to use them as an architectural asset for order and sightliness, to combine engineering with architecture to produce harmony.

In all cases the problem of design has been considered as a problem in creation to tell the story of material construction and spirit of to-day. in the language of the Architect as an artist and craftsman. The effort was made theobpaint the spiratuofistyle tmodified to comply with the spirit of to-day. To obtain originality and individuality and to avoid the usual and the commonplace. When and where the opportunity offered new forms of design and of detail were designed for the use of modern materials and modern forms of construction and the effort made to give these beauty of form and proportion. This applies more especially to the industrial type of architectural design developed by Albert Kahn and the writer and first exemplified in the Ford Motor Plant. Highland Park. Mich. The Ford Sales Building Broadway. New York was possibly the first building in New York to be designed in the modern spirit now used generally. The use of detail was regarded as an essential element of design and as a test of the designers skill in telling the story of to-day. to meet this condition much thought and study was used to evalve new types of design in detail which would harmonise with present day conditions in material, in construction, and in expressing our present day form of culture and civilision. An illustration of the author's reluction of detail in design might be cited as the Doorway Entrance to the Administration Building of the Hudson Motor Plant. It has been the writer's opinion that an architetural designer must be wersatile and capable in all styles and in his work has endevoured to meet this test. in the Gothic field. In the Classic field and the Medern field.and to do this without reproducing the work of other (minds. In each he has tired to add some contribution of his own.

Am very sorry to have to advise you that conditions beyond my control make it impossible for me to be present in person for the Geremony of Presentation of Fellowhip Certificates to the members to be honored for their service to Architecture.

Were conditions normal I would surely have given myself the pleasure of visiting California and attending the Convention.

But Canada is now at war.A trip to California would entail considerable expense. and the conversion of Canadian funds into American currency. Such conversion is now subject to rigid control by the Canadian Government.

The urgent need of Canada for American dredit to pay for war supplies require that expenditure by Canadians for travel in the States be reduced to a minimum. To ensure this a special permit has to be obtained from the Foreign Exchange Control Board and such is only grantediffanddwhen extraordinary conditions warrent such expenditure.

Under these conditions a trip to California is impossible for the needed permit will not be given.

Pray convey to the Jury of Fellows my high appreciation of the honor accored me in my election to a Feulowship in the A.I.A.It is my cordial wish that the Convention will be very successful in all it's phases. I am.





Ernest Wilby, 89, Noted Architect

WINDSOR, Ontario, Dec. 12 (P).—Prof. Ernest Wilby, 89, one of North America's most distinguished architects, died yesterday.

Prof. Wilby, originator of the concrete pier and steel sash type of industrial construction, has lived here since 1930.

He supervised construction of Henry Ford's huge Highland Park plant, the Hill Auditorium at Ann Arbor, Mich, and the Detroit News building. He taught architecture at the University of Michigan from 1923 to 1929.
