





Since the early 50's, the nominee, as member, director, and vice-president of the Boston Architectural Center School of Architecture, has been a quiet, driving, dedicated force that has assured the continuation of educational opportunities for students at the evening School of Architecture and an expanding educational program for the public and the profession. While serving on the Building and Finance Committees, the nominee's decisive leadership and able guidance through financial and governmental affairs has enabled the Boston Architectural Center to obtain Federal assistance essential to the realization of a new 6-story building. Since 1958, with the help of the nominee's devoted interest, the BAC has made rapid progress: educational program has been expanded; student enrollment has increased from 140 to 414; space, from 10,000 sq. ft. to 44,000 sq. ft.; operating budget from \$17,500 to \$219,000. 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Historically, the Boston Architectural Center, first known as the Boston Architectural Club, began its role in the education of an architect in 1889, as part of the Beaux Arts System. During the middle thirties, the Boston Architectural Center established its own curriculum. The name of the institution was changed to Boston Architectural Center in 1944. All through its eighty year history, the Boston Architectural Center School of Architecture has continued its open door admissions policy for the entering student, with evening and weekend classes conducted by a volunteer faculty, made available by members of the architectural and engineering professions and by professors and graduate students of the Harvard Graduate School of Design; Massachusetts Institute of Technology School of Architecture and City Planning; and the Harvard School of Fine Arts.

In 1958, when it was learned that the Boston Architectural Center building on Somerset Street, Boston was to be taken by eminent domain for Boston's New Government Center, the nominee recommended that studies be made of the BAC's future requirements; and that both the use of an existing building and the construction of a new building (which he favored) be taken into consideration.

After an extensive search for new quarters, in late 1960, the nominee was appointed to a committee to purchase a four-story 100 year old carriage house at 320 Newbury Street, Boston. The Boston Architectural Center moved into this building during the summer of 1961.

In 1961 to 1963, the nominee was asked to chair a committee to have remodelling plans prepared. A fund raising campaign was launched. By 1962, remodelling costs were determined, but they seemed higher than the cost of constructing a new modest building.

After exhausting meetings and appraisals, under the leadership of a new president, the directors of the Boston Architectural Center on October 31, 1963, voted to hold a design competition for a new building. This was the beginning of the realization of the nominee's great vision.

The nominee was now the strength and guiding force of a three-man Building Committee, which supervised with utmost care and experience, the building process and the completion of new quarters in 1966.

Early in 1965, when an application for a Grant under the new Higher Education Facilities Act was turned down, the nominee was able to obtain from the Finance Committee of the New England Mutual Life Insurance Company a mortgage loan committment of \$500,000. This, together with previously raised funds, carried the Center along with a sense of success.

In April 1965, under the guidance of the nominee, the school moved to temporary cramped quarters at 338 Newbury Street; the building on the site of 320 Newbury Street was demolished, and construction began on the new building.

In June 1965, as Vice President of the Boston Architectural Center, the nominee's devotion and human philosophy was exemplified when he helped prepare and then deliver by hand the application of the Boston Architectural Center for \$750,000 (at 3-3/4% 40-year loan) to the Director of Undergraduate Loans Branch of the Office of Education, Department of Health, Education and Welfare. At first, it was doubtful whether the BAC could qualify as an educational institution of higher learning. The nominee, however, through his belief in the Center's goals, his resourcefulness, understanding and special knowledge, was able to rally such forces as Ralph Rapson, Dean of the School of Architecture at the University of Minnesota and former teacher at the BAC; Philip Bourne, F. A. I. A., now Regional Director for the A. I. A.; and, with a letter from Senator Edward Brooke, then Attorney General of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, was able to successfully portray the Boston Architectural Center as an institution of higher education worthy of Federal support and assistance. The government officials, impressed by the sincerity of the nominee, approved the application and made the loan available in fourteen days. (This set some kind of a record for prompt government service!) Following the completion of the building in 1966, the original request for a cash grant of \$192,000 was also received.

Enforced by this financial assistance, the nominee, with the help of many others, was effective in making this fine school and its unique educational curriculum stronger and more effective, translating the educational and the professional needs into a building: the necessary tools and means to a more meaningful education for architectural students, the public and the profession. EXHIBIT #4 attached (Activities 1967-68, the Boston Architectural Center) indicates in outline form the breadth and scope of the Center's programs for students, the profession and the community.

The Center has provided low cost education to young apprentices in the profession by aid through scholarships and awards, and has offered refresher courses for candidates for registration as architects. Outstanding celebrities have lectured at the Center and many distinguished educators have contributed to its programs.

As a result of the vision, dedication and devotion of its members, the Boston Architectural Center has built a strong organization, which has been able to provide excellent facilities to hold A.I.A. meetings and keep the practitioner aware of the flow of new ideas and the rapid changes in our contemporary world. Through exhibits, conferences and seminars, the Center is able to bring the profession of architecture and its functions to the attention of the public.

We, the Board of Directors of the Boston Society of Architects, therefore, nominate the Boston Architectural Center for the "Citation for an Organization" award because of:

- its awareness of the need for, and its provision of, an active public relations program to cope with the tremendous social, economic, cultural and technical changes affecting Architecture;

- its interest in the education of young apprentices, demonstrated by an intensive varied program and increased scholarships, and its efforts to continue the education of the practitioner; and

As Secretary of the Massachusetts State Association of Architects, Chapter of the American Institute of Architects, the nominee handled the normal routine details of the office promptly and efficiently, kept careful and accurate minutes, arranged for business and dinner meetings, etc., and kept the profession well informed.

Of greater substance, however, was the constant and continued effort of the nominee to bring about the return of the A. I. A. Charter to the Boston Society of Architects, which they had relinquished in 1948 to the Massachusetts State Association of Architects. (In 1960, the A. I. A. Charter was returned to the Boston Society of Architects.)

The nominee served as member and then chairman of the Harleston Parker Medal Committee, which made the selection of the building, (See Suppl. page 7A)

Nominee is architectural consultant, a salaried position of senior responsibility for New England Mutual Life Insurance Company of Boston, Massachusetts.

1. With respect to buildings to be built by the Company as income producing investments, nominee is responsible for having produced all studies of feasibility and design development leading to the overall project concept to be adopted by the Company; for the selection of architects, engineers, contractors and others; for directing the production of designs, plans and specifications; for negotiating contracts for the construction thereof and supervising construction; and for final approval of all disbursements of Company funds in payment for labor, materials, and services.

One such project, the 261 unit Eastgate Apartment in Cambridge, was executed by a team of architects assembled by nominee, comprising Robert Woods Kennedy, Ralph Rapson, Vernon Demars, Carl Koch, and William Hoskins Brown. See EXHIBIT #6 and #7.

This building, completed in 1950, contained innovative features such as "skip floor" corridors, through ventilation, etc., that drew wide public attention and earned for its designers an A.I.A. award of merit. Also, nominee negotiated with the Contractor, George A. Fuller Company, a fixed price construction contract with contingency permitting owner to share in cost savings which was thereafter adopted by many others and is known as the "Eastgate" contract.

Another such project is the Research and Development Headquarters for Edgerton, Germeshausen & Grier, Inc., constructed in two stages, four years apart, from designs of Charles E. Luckeman & Associates, Architects. See photo #4.

A third such project is the development of the so-called Shore Club property, a thirty-five acre apartment project acquired by the Company in 1964 in a partially developed stage. Nominee conducted feasibility studies and assembled a young architectural team of Messrs. Richard Homer, John Rogers, Fletcher Ashley, John Myers, which has established a design concept and master plan covering town houses, low and high rise apartment structures of which 80 units are now under construction. Upon completion the project may involve as many as 550 units. It is to be noted that Messrs. Ashley and Myers were winners of the Boston Architectural Center competition for a new building.

Yet another is the redevelopment just getting under way of the Company's Arlington Village property in Arlington, Virginia, now consisting of 655 garden apartment units built in 1938 on 46 acres within a mile of the Pentagon. Nominee is in charge of feasibility master plan and zoning studies that may result in redevelopment involving 1500 new apartment units.

2. With respect to land development financed by the Company in partnership with experienced land developers, nominee has the responsibility for analyzing, advising and recommending with respect to all architectural aspects of land layout, grading, roads, utilities and landscaping, master planning and plans and specifications for all buildings to be built and for achieving coordination of the architectural aspects of the land developers activities with those of the Company.

A current example of this activity is the 92 acre New England Executive Park in Burlington, Mass. on Route 128, where initial major structures include an office building for bank occupancy being designed by Welton, Becket Associates, a speculative office building to be designed by Eduardo Catalano and others now in preliminary developmental stages of development

3. With respect to existing income producing properties to be acquired by the Company, nominee is responsible for analysis of plans and specifications, location and siting of the properties, costs of reproduction and maintenance and all other factors of an architectural nature necessary for the Company to consider in making the acquisition.

Examples are the Baldwin Hills Village, a 627-unit garden apartment project on 65 acres in Los Angeles acquired in 1949, and Arlington Village mentioned above, acquired in 1952.

4. With respect to properties in which the Company invests as a mortgage lender, or which it constructs to the specifications of others who occupy them under long term lease, nominee analyzes and approves plans and specifications; makes recommendations for change and approves all changes; and follows the course of construction and approves disbursements of all Company funds.

The foregoing delineates a position in industry that involves a sphere of magnitude. Over \$42 million of buildings have been built for the Company's account under the supervision of nominee. The Company's investment portfolio now includes over a billion dollars of mortgage loans having grown during nominee's tenure from \$150 million, and over \$90 million of real estate owned outright with an additional \$40 million committed to land development activity.

Throughout, nominee has sought by his activity to increase the recognition of professional architectural competence and to raise the standards of professional performance primarily in the area of apartment projects, office buildings, industrial parks and shopping centers.

The nominee likes the routines of architecture, and in order to continue to draw upon his creativity, has conducted a residential practice, as well as filling the salaried position with New England Mutual Life Insurance Company. Since 1947, residences have been completed from Essex, Connecticut to Winter Harbor, Maine, including the Sherwin Badger House in Sherborn, Massachusetts, the Willauer and Dwinnell residences in Dedham, Massachusetts, and the Maynard House at Prouts Neck, Maine. Of twenty custom designs, six were by the nominee and fourteen by Homer-Willauer, Architects.

During the last twenty-two years, the nominee has executed over 45 alterations to residences, medical clinics, and offices. A canvas of nominee's residential clients reveals their great respect for nominee's architectural advice and assistance.
