

 - a. First supplementary dues structure established by Chapter in order to provide for adequate funds to run Chapter on business-like basis.
 - b. First Chapter executive secretary employed.
 - c. Established the Chapter magazine as a Chapter enterprise rather than a commercial venture.
 - d. Created position of Chapter "Archivist" for retaining Chapter records.
 - e. Defined and established the duties of the various committees in order to maintain continuity and increase effectiveness of committee work.
 - f. Accent was placed on membership growth and Chapter grew rapidly particularly with the younger Architects.
 - g. One of the best Standards of Architectural Service folders in existence was produced. It was complimented and copied by many other Chapters.
- 5. Board of Directors, 1957-1960.
- 6. Chapter Contracts and Fees Committee Instrumental in working with William H. Deitrick, FAIA, and Anthony Lord, FAIA, in establishing the first graduated fee scale that was adopted by the State of North Carolina making it possible for younger Architects to get a start on smaller commissions at a reasonable fee.
- 7. Chapter Legal Affairs Committee, Co-Chairman Instrumental in presenting and following through successfully on several Amendments to the State's Architectural Practice Act before the General Assembly of North Carolina in 1957, which has resulted in one of the best practicing Acts in the United States.
- 8. Chapter Judiciary Committee Chairman and various other Chapter Committee work.
