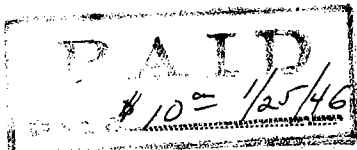





L. S. Winslow, White House Architect, Dies

Lorenzo Simmons Winslow, architect of the White House during the Roosevelt and Truman administrations, died June 20 at his home in St. Petersburg, Fla. He was 85.

Mr. Winslow supervised extensive repairs and renovations at the executive mansion, including the major reconstruction project that was completed in 1952. Virtually the entire interior of the building was taken out and restored and rebuilt during the four-year undertaking.

In addition, Mr. Winslow also presided over the addition of the controversial Truman balcony to the south portico of the White House in 1948.

His first project at the White House was installation of the swimming pool during the Roosevelt administration. Later in the Roosevelt years, he modeled the executive offices and the kitchen, and in 1941, built the bomb shelter.

In 1942, he built the East Wing where he had his office until 1953, when he left government service to enter private practice here.

Mr. Winslow was born in Mansfield, Mass., in 1892, and attended Vassar and University, Ohio Northern University, Harvard, MIT and the Sorbonne in Paris.

During World War I he won several decorations while serving as a second lieutenant with the Army in France.

He practiced architecture in Greensboro, N.C., from 1925 to 1931, when he came

here to work for the federal government.

In addition to work at the White House, his government projects included improvements at the Statue of Liberty, construction of bridges and roadways in

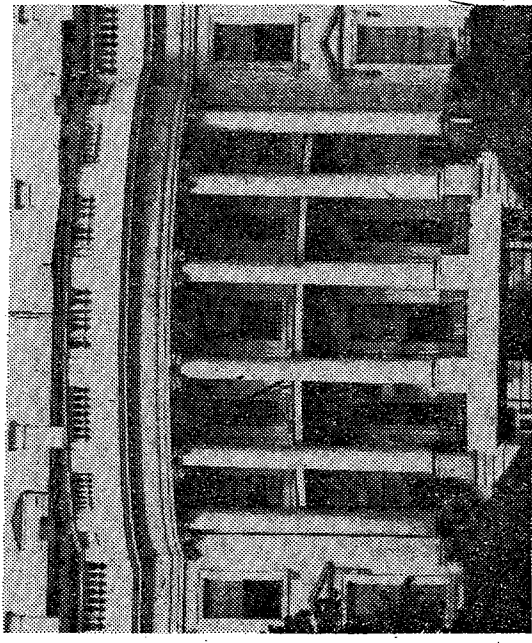
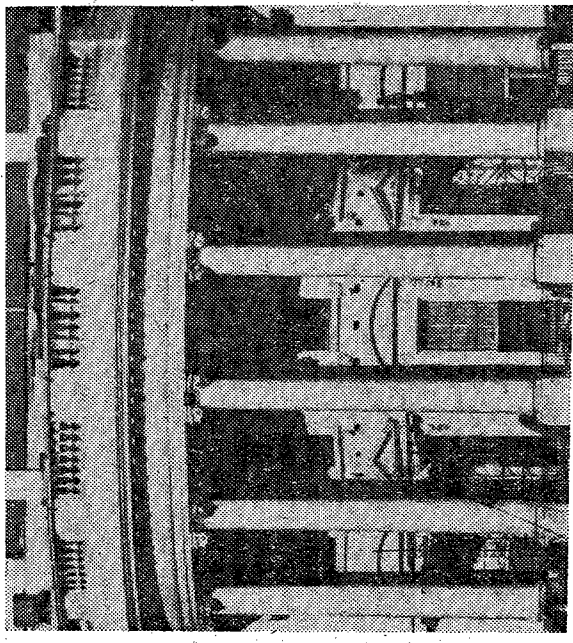
Rock Creek Park and road approaches to the Arlington Memorial Bridge.

Mr. Winslow began working at the executive mansion in 1933 and was formally named architect of the White House in 1940.

His private commissions here in the 1950s and 1960s included restoration of Georgetown Presbyterian Church and the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church.

A descendant of an old New England family, he belonged to many historical and patriotic organizations, including the Order of the Crown of Charlemagne U.S.A., the Baronial Order of Magna Charta, the Society of Mayflower Descendants; the Society of Colonial Wars, the Order of Americans of Armorial Ancestry, the Order of Descendants of Colonial Clergy and the Sons of the American Revolution, among others.

In addition to his wife, Virginia, of the home, survivors include two daughters, Priscilla Small, of Washington and Fort Loudon, Pa., and Vaughan B. Elliott, of Pelham, N.Y.; three brothers, Benton, of Foxboro, Mass., Eben of Brockton, Mass., and Gilbert of Mansfield, and five grandchildren. His former wife, Garnette B. Winslow lives in Fort Loudon.

In 1931 or 1932 he joined the Building Management Bureau under Charles Peters, (Building Management Bureau now of P.B.A.) but at that time probably under the National Parks and Planning Commission. He is said to be responsible for the design of a government warehouse at 7th & D Sts. in which the supervising architects' office and its bureaus were formerly located.

Soon after F.D.R. became President, he borrowed Mr. Winslow from the Building Management Bureau to supervise some minor work at the White House--Mr. Winslow being a cousin of Mrs. Roosevelt.

F.D.R. eventually created the office of Architect^{Paris} of the White House and appointed Winslow to head it in 1941. It is ^{Paris} the practice to draw from the P.B.A. draftsmen when needed for special work at the White House.
