



Thereafter, the firm of Einbull, Steele & Sandham might apply for appointment as associate architect with the principal architoot, at the same time setting out their general qualifications, exhibits of executed work and letters of endorsement.

Perhaps a botter way them this is for those interested to come to Washington and confer with the powers that be in the Treasury Department. I hesitate to make the latter suggestion beonuse the architects are appading a large total which they can illuefford in reilread fare to Washington. ... 

My dear Mr. Bergstrom:

This is to acknowledge your letter of February 24 concerning Mr. William L. Steele. I am obliged to you for your opinion and I appreciate your kindness in writing me.

I have also received a letter from Mr. Steele As I wrote him, during the next few years the architectural services of Professor White's office. which heretofore have been its most important function, are not likely to be much in demand. The State will not be in a position, for some time I am afraid, to appropriate funds for new buildings except perhaps to complete the Medical and Dental Building in Chicago, plans and drawings for which have been completed. Such architectural work as may be required can be performed by the present personnel of that office. In other words, for the next few years the important function of that office will be the operation and maintenance of the physical plant. Under these circumstances it might be that the position would not be particularly attractive to Mr. Steele.

The Board of Trustees has appointed a committee to study the University's business and also its physical plant organization with a view to making any adjustments which changing conditions made desirable. I will see that your letter is placed before this committee for consideration in case the decision is made to bring in an architect from the outside to head up the activities of the present Supervising Architect's Office.





1862-1934

All that has been written or publicly said about our friend "Tom" Kimball is true. Each month that has gone by since his passing last September has deepened my sense of appreciation for his true self. He was primarily unselfish, therefore, an ideal professional man. His interests were many and varied, so much so that he often neglected his own affairs. An appeal from a friend or from a cause to which he was sympathetic met with instant and whole-hearted response. Once given, his support and cooperation were never withdrawn. He allowed his own reputation to be assailed when he was screening some one else whom he felt was entitled to his protection and sponsorship.

He was brilliant in debate, logical and clear in his thinking, an ardent proponent of professional ideals, especially where architecture was concerned. He was a Fellow in the Institute, served on all its important committees, was President, first of the Institute, and then of the Press. His architectural secomplishment was conscientious, substantial, and always painstakingly correct. At times he scaled the heights. He was artist, architect, engineer, scientist, teacher, and ever a student and thinker. He was an athlete, a sportsman, an old-fashioned gentleman.

He appreciated honest praise, but hated flattery, toadyism, shams, and meaningless ceremony. His was one of those rere natures, I think like Thomas Jefferson(s, in which the aristocrat and the man of humble rank were so happily combined that Tom sould be perfectly at home with either.

He was a man whose memory challenges us, his surviving friends, to be somehow worthy of having owned his friendship. We cannot remember him truly if we forget his stimulating manhood, his essential straightness, his crusading courage.

This tribute to his memory is humbly made in the hope that we can help make the seeds Tom Kimball planted bear fruit.



iation since it's origin.

Resolved that we record our appreciation of the inspiring and cherished example which he has given us in his unselfish service to the highest ideals of his profession."
