



Waterbury, Connecticut, May 17, 1969 -- Joseph Stein an architect in Waterbury for 21 years, has been elected to the College of Fellows of The American Institute of Architects, a lifetime honor bestowed for outstanding contribution. He will be formally invested during special ceremonies at the annual convention of the AIA in Chicago, June 22-26.

Although AIA is the 23,300-member national professional society of architects, only 893 members have been advanced to Fellowship. As a Fellow, Mr. Stein will have the right to use the initials FAIA following his name to symbolize the esteem in which he is held by his peers. The premature death of this renowned artist has saddened the city. There are thousands who did not know him but use and admire the buildings he helped create. They will be a permanent reminder of this distinguished architect who left beauty wherever he worked.

Ironically, one of the last buildings designed by Stein for the City of Waterbury could not be constructed in time for him to see. The new police headquarters building on East Main Street, now being built, will be the final city monument to his memory.

500 attend Stein rites

More than 500 persons attended funeral services Wednesday for Joseph Stein, 61, a nationally honored Waterbury architect who died early Tuesday morning at Waterbury Hospital.

Among the mourners at the services were locally prominent politicians, builders, friends, relatives and author Arthur Miller of Roxbury, who was a neighbor and friend of Stein's.

The services were held in Temple Israel on Williamson Drive and Rabbi Apncld Miller officiated. Among Stein's designs are the Brenson Library, Waterbury Club, Temple Israel, Savings Towers Apartments and many private dwellings in the area.
