These men are applicants for membership in the Institute from Wisconsin. I do not know whether these men are already vouched for at all. Frank J. Stepnoski was registered by examination. The rest are exemption men. I do not know Genry G. Lotter. Wm. A. Merigold may be an addition to the Institute. He has been employed almost exclusively by the Victor G. Lawson Estate or at least was so employed in 1917, and he may be more competent than I have knowledge of . Green Lake's population is 600.

Frank M. Riley of Madison, Wisc., a competent architect. There is no other Frank Riley registered in Wisconsin.

R. L. Rote is perfectly respectable. Monroe has a population of \$5.200. He and his father operate the anly lumber and coal yard in Monroe. That is they did in 1917, and R. L.
