I cite the U. S. Embassy in New Delhi and the U. S. Pavilion at the Brussels Exposition as examples of the calibre and quality of Mr. Stone's design ability. I feel it is important to recognize that such high calibre expressions of architectural design come equally well from the smaller organizations in our profession. Because of Mr. Stone's prominence, in national and international projects, it would seem only appropriate that we recognize his stature as an architect by this recognition.

I therefore heartily endorse his nomination.
