MASSACHUSETTS ARCHITECT HONORED

Hugh Stubbins of Cambridge is believed to be the first American architect ever honored by having a building he designed reproduced on a stamp of a foreign nation. The stamp, issued by the German Federal Republic, depicts the Berlin Congress Hall. Stubbins was named for the assignment by American Institute of Architects after the institute was asked by the State Department to provide plans. The building was suggested by Mrs. Eleanor Dulles, a special assistant to the director of the State Department's Office for German Affairs. Stubbins is the architect for the new North Grafton Elementary School, now under construction, and an industrial arts and sciences addition to Grafton High School, for which plans were recently approved by the state.

Dear Hugh!

The Institute's committee structure has become so cumbersome and complicated that not only were we functioning inefficiently but also the financial burden of supporting the committees prevented us from engaging in other needed services to the members. The Board therefore had a study made for the purpose of streamlining our organization. This study recommended a number of changes which have been put into effect. These changes included the abolishment of some committees and reductions in personnel in others.

The Committee on the Home Building Industry has now become a standing vertical committee of only five members. The reduction naturally entails disappointment to those loyal and devoted members who have not been designated to continue on the committee. Personnel decisions were difficult in the extreme, as virtually without exception all members of committees have made substantial contributions to the welfare of the profession and prestige of The Institute.

Selection of those to continue was made by The Board by ballot - in many instances only after prolonged balloting.

Although you have not been selected to continue, The Board has requested me to convey to you its deep gratitude for the service you have rendered and expresses the hope that in the not too distant future further opportunity will be given to call upon you again.

Gentlemen:

Mr. Josiah H. Child, Chairman of our Honors Committee, has forwarded to me your letter of December 23rd with the first page of the Nomination for Fellowship of Messrs. Aldrich, Beckwith and Stubbins. Your request for additional signatures is, of course, related to the usual chapter organization headed by a small executive committee. Our Chapter, which is governed by a "Chapter Board" which is elected from Districts in the State, comprises twenty-five members and it becomes a fairly complicated procedure to secure the signatures of the entire group as requested. You may recall that in an earlier instance I pointed out to you that our Board acts on nominations of our Honors Committee and accepts the recommendations of that Committee by a majority vote. The Board as a whole cannot act in any other way intelligently and many of the members may not be informed in detail except by report of the Honors Committee of the qualifications of the candidates for fellowship. Some of them may be unwilling to vote favorably for personal reasons even after the report of the Committee has been received.

To obtain all signatures would necessitate the circulation of these pages or replacement pages by mail to all the members of the Board who have not already signed, as many of them do not reside in Boston and would naturally meet with some refusals and certainly would be a tedious procedure. The large number of signatures obtained includes a substantial majority and was secured at a meeting when those members were present.

In this same connection, and if the Institute requires letters from all members of the Board, it will inevitably be true that a few members will write informed and helpful letters; all the others will write what they are advised to write by the Honors Committee and

their letters will make no individual contribution.

This Chapter will make every effort to comply with whatever rules the Institute establishes, but feels this is a situation deserving your special consideration.

Hugh Stubbins was a member of the faculty of the School of Architecture at Harvard University for thirteen years and Chairman of the Department of Architecture in 1953. He is an Associate of the National Academy of Design and a Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences.

Mr. Stubbins has won numerous National competitions and honors in his profession. He has designed outstanding buildings in America where his practice consists of schools, community and recreation buildings, office buildings, urban redevelopment projects and residential constructions.

Mr. Stubbins was the Architect chosen by a special committee of the A.I.A. to design the now famous Congress Hall in West Berlin which was completed and dedicated in 1957. He is also the Architect for the new U.S. Consulate in Tangier, Morocco. In Boston, his firm has designed the new luxury apartment building at 330 Beacon Street and in Cambridge, the new Loeb Drama Center for Harvard University and a new apartment building for Continental Terrace is also his design.

Mr. Stubbins has served on several national committees for the A.I.A.* and is Chairman of the Architectural Advisory Committee for the proposed Government Center Project in Boston.

Through the years of his practice, much of Mr. Stubbins' work has been published in all the major architectural publications both in this country and abroad; and he has served on many national committees and juries allied with the profession.

Hugh Stubbins' design of Citicorp Center may be the most radical achievement of his distinguished architectural career, which has included many innovative, problem-solving buildings. Among them are such pioneering buildings as the Berlin Congress Hall, designed in 1955, which made daring use of a dramatic cantenary roof truss formation; the Loeb Drama Center, Cambridge, Massachusetts, designed in 1958, the first fully flexible theater in the United States; and the Veterans Stadium, Philadelphia, designed in 1966, which employs the unique "Octorad" plan form -based on eight points of radii of two concentric circles--to give football and baseball fans equally advantageous views of the game. While Stubbins has never pursued innovation for its own sake, he does believe in exploiting the leading edge of technology to fulfill the practical and aesthetic needs of human beings.

Stubbins gained his Master of Architecture at Harvard University in 1935, and went on to become Walter Gropius' assistant, and later his successor as Chairman of the Department of Architecture at the Harvard Graduate School of Design. His early practice was distinguished for his design of a number of low budget modern houses which gained recognition in the national press. Indeed, his adaptation of braced frame construction to the contemporary house was one of the generators of modern architecture in New England. His 1940 design for 100 units of defense housing at Windsor Locks, Connecticut, was cited by the Museum of Modern Art as one of the best 50 examples of architecture in ten years.


In the late 1940's and early 1950's, the Stubbins office moved into the educational field with the design of a series of flexible schools in response to early experiments in team teaching. The sensitivity of the firm's campus work, which includes major buildings at Princeton University, the University of California, Mt. Holyoke College, Rochester Institute of Technology, and Harvard's Countway Library of Medicine, was a significant factor in the 1967 presentation to Hugh Stubbins and Associates of the American Institute of Architects (AIA) firm award. Stubbins' 1972 design for the Pusey Library at Harvard, placed below grade to avoid disruption of the hallowed Harvard Yard, was honored for its environmental integrity by an AIA award of merit.

In recent years, the Stubbins firm has moved into the area of multi-million dollar urban development with Citicorp Center, New York, and the Federal Reserve Bank of Boston just reaching completion.

Although he left Harvard in 1953 to devote more time to his practice, Stubbins has maintained his involvement in architectural education by lecturing and being a visiting critic at a number of schools, by supervising the Rotch travelling scholarship, and as a member of the AIA Jury of Fellows. He is a Fellow in design of the American Institute of Architects, an Academician of the National Academy of Design, and was the 1975 recipient of the Gold Medal for Excellence in Design from Tau Sigma Delta, the National Honor Fraternity for Architecture and Allied Arts. In 1976, his book Architecture — The Design Experience was published in New York by John Wiley & Sons.

Hugh Stubbins Jr., 94, an architect whose Citigroup Center in Manhattan, with its sharply angled roof, is a major icon on the New York skyline, died July 5 at Mount Auburn Hospital in Cambridge, Mass. He had pneumonia.

Mr. Stubbins also designed such noted buildings as Boston's Federal Reserve Bank; the Ronald Reagan Presidential Library in Simi Valley, Calif.; and Congress Hall, now known as House of World Cultures, in Berlin.

The 59-story Citigroup (formerly Citicorp) Center, dedicated in 1977, broke with the "glass box" form of modern skyscrapers with its roof, piercing the sky at a 45-degree angle.

It appears to sit on four huge columns — not at the corners, but in the middle of each side of the building. Tucked in one corner is a church, also designed by Mr. Stubbins, that replaces one that was torn down to build the complex.

"By any standard the architect, Hugh Stubbins & Associates of Cambridge, Mass., has created one of New York's significant buildings," the New York Times wrote.

Appraising Mr. Stubbins's Federal Reserve building in Boston, the same Times critic, Paul Goldberger, declared it one of the best modern buildings in the city, "more dramatic and more elegant" than the Citicorp building.

For the Reagan Library, Mr. Stubbins drew upon California's traditional mission-style architecture. The House of World Cultures, which opened in West Berlin in 1957 as a gift from the United States, features a futuristic flaring roof.

He also designed Landmark Tower in Yokohama, Japan's tallest building, and Veterans Stadium, which, before it was torn down two years ago, was

the home of the Philadelphia Phillies and the Philadelphia Eagles.

Among his honors was the Gold Medal for Excellence in Design from Tau Sigma Delta, the national honorary fraternity for architecture and the allied arts.

Hugh Asher Stubbins Jr. was born in Birmingham, Ala., and graduated from the Georgia Institute of Technology. He received a master's in ar-

chitecture from Harvard University in 1935, where he later taught.

His marriage to Diana Hamilton Moore ended in divorce. His second wife, Colette Fadeuhille, died in 1992. His third wife, June Kootz, died in 2001.

Survivors include four children from his first marriage and nine grandchildren.

Hugh Stubbins Jr., 94, Creator Of Emblematic Skyscrapers

Hugh Stubbins Jr., an architect best known for the angular tower of the Citicorp Center in Manhattan, but also noted for his design of the Reagan Presidential Library in California and of the tallest building in Japan, died on Wednesday in Cambridge, Mass. He was 94.

The cause was pneumonia, said his son Hugh Stubbins III of Camden, Me.


Although considered a Modernist, Mr. Stubbins was no strict adherent to that architectural style. His design for the Reagan Library in Simi Valley evokes the stucco and red-tile roofs of the mission style.

Citing the sleek, aluminum-sheathed Citicorp building at Lexington Avenue and 53rd Street, Paul Goldberger, the architecture critic for The New Yorker and, until recently, dean of the Parsons School of Design, called it "probably the most important skyscraper built in New York in the 1970's because of its elegant and memorable shape, but also because of its engagement with the city at the base."

The sloping roof of the 914-foot-tall tower, now known as Citigroup Center, has become a symbol of the city's skyline, Mr. Goldberger said. At its base is a large public space that is filled with stores, restaurants and room for public activity. "So it was a model for the skyscraper woven into the fabric of the city," Mr. Goldberger said. The building, completed in 1978, was designed by Mr. Stubbins in association with Emery Roth & Sons.

Hugh Asher Stubbins Jr. was born on Jan. 11, 1912, the son of Hugh and Lucille Stubbins of Birmingham, Ala. His father was a shoe salesman. Mr. Stubbins graduated from the Georgia Institute of Technology in 1932. A tall, trim man, he was a nationally ranked track star while in college, and an Olympic candidate until he was sidelined by a pulled hamstring. In 1935, he earned a master's degree in architecture from the Harvard Graduate School of Design.

Mr. Stubbins was married three times. His marriage to Diana Moore in 1938 ended in divorce in 1965. His second wife, Colette Fadeuihle, died in 1995. His third wife, June Kootz, died in 2001. In addition to his son Hugh Stubbins III, who is also an ar-

chitect, Mr. Stubbins is survived two other sons, Peter, of Sausalito, Calif., and Michael, of Alexandria, Va.; a daughter, Patricia Minot of Bradenton, Fla.; and nine grandchildren.

Mr. Stubbins and his firm, Hugh Stubbins and Associates, designed more than 800 buildings in eight countries, including many buildings on college campuses.

After World War II, Mr. Stubbins was commissioned by the United States government to design the Berlin Congress Hall in West Germany, a theater and exhibition space that some people refer to as the "pregnant oyster" because its roof slopes between two arches. Built in view of the East German border, it was seen as a symbol of American efforts to help West Germany recover.

Among Mr. Stubbins's other favorite structures, his son said, was the Federal Reserve Bank in downtown Boston, which opened in 1978. A 600-foot aluminum and glass tower, it is notable for its sunshades on each floor, giving the facade the appearance of a washboard, which are designed to protect the glass from glare and to alleviate the downward forces of wind at the street level.

In 1993, Mr. Stubbins completed his last building, the Landmark Tower in Yokohama, Japan. The 60-story building, which flares at its base, is the tallest building in Japan.
