

The Board of Examiners of The Institute, at its meeting at The Octagon on Dec. 21,1936 gave consideration to the application for reinstatement from M. H. Starkweather, former Institute Member of the Southern California Chapter.

It found that Mr. Starkweather was not indebted to The Institute and that his readmission was recommended by the Executive Committee of the Southern California Chapter.

Consideration was also given to the By-law requirement that readmissions must be under the same procedure as first admissions, but inasmuch as the new form of application had not been issued by The Institute, it was the decision of The Board that Mr. Starkweather's request for readmission, under date of May 12, 1936, and accompanying correspondence, be accepted as sufficient documentation.

1. Mr. Starkweather was the first registered architect in Arizona to join the American Institute of Architects. He became a member of the Southern California Chapter in 1931. During the ensuing years, he felt the need for a local chapter in Arizona and was instrumental in organizing the Arizona Chapter in 1937 with members in both Tucson and Phoenix. During the early years of this chapter, 1937-1949, he served as president, secretary, and on the governing board of the chapter. He filled all the positions in a most competent manner and exerted a strong influence in expanding the membership and strengthening the infuence of the chapter.

When the Rocky Mountain Region of the Institute was formed in , Mr. Starkweather, because of his outstanding work with the Arizona Chapter, was nominated for and became the first director of this new region. During his two-year tour of duty as director, he not only attended all board meetings presenting the problems faced by the architects in this area, but also paid visits to other chapters in the region to keep the members advised of national matters. As the original director, he gave generously of his time in pulling the new region together.

In 1957, on the Centenary of the Institute, in recognition of his services, Mr. Starkweather was awarded a Certificate of Merit as a pioneer architect by the Southern Arizona Chapter.

Throughout his career, Mr. Starkweather, as a senior architect, has given generously of his time in assisting younger architects with his very practical advice when called on to do so.

NOMINEE'S ACHIEVEMENT IN PUBLIC SERVICE

Charter Member, American Legion.

Served in France during First World War with 23rd Engineers and as lieutenant with the 52nd C.A.C.

Member of all Masonic bodies, 33rd Degree Scottish Rite and Stage Director for twenty-six years.

Member of Elks with various offices including three Grand Lodge elective offices.

Past Director, Tucson Chamber of Commerce.

Secretary of Elks Charity Hospital for nineteen years.

Director, Children's Hospital for four years.

As Chairman of the Tucson Planning and Zoning Commission, he exerted a strong influence to orderly change during a most trying period of explosive expansion in the city's growth. This certainly was a professional contribution of great, though perhaps unrecognized value to the architectural community.

Dear Mr. Merry:

I hereby request that, as of January 1, 1971, my membership be changed to that of Emeritus status. My dues are paid for the year 1970 to the Arizona Chapter and the National Organization.

I am reluctantly enclosing my check for \$35.00, which was the assessment voted by the members, since I did not approve the manner in which it was voted. 
M. H. Starkweather dies; noted architect, civic leader

Merritt Howard Starkweather, architect of many Tucson schools and commercial buildings, and founder or contribuor to many Tucson organizations, died yesterday at the age of 80.

A native of Chicago, he learned draftsmanship in his father's interior woodworking factory at Oshkosh, Wis. He furthered his architectural training in Spokane and at Los Angeles before coming to Tucson in 1915.

Starkweather enlisted in 1917 in the 23rd U.S. Engineers, and served in France as a French-trained artillery officer. He rose to the rank of second lieutenant and later was a charter member of Morgan McDermott Post of the American Legion.

He helped the late Sheriff Ed Echols found the Tucson Rodeo 47 years ago by designing a crude arena on the then vacant land north of the 2200 block of East Elm Street. He later designed the present ro-

deo facilities on South 6th Avenue. He was rodeo chairman from 1944-1946.

He was chairman of the City Zoning Commission for 11 years, beginning in 1946. He was president or the Board of Health in 1926, and was elected to the City Council in 1924.

Buildings designed by Starkweather here include Carrillo, Drachman, Bonillas and Doolen Junior High schools; Tucson High Stadium; St. John's Parish School; St. Joseph's Academy and a St. Mary's Hospital addition and convent.

He founded the Arizona chapter of the American Institute of Architects (AIA) in 1937. He was named a fellow of the AIA in 1968 for public service.

He was a charter member of the Tucson Kiwanis Club and a 33rd degree Mason. He also served the Elks as exalted ruler, state president and grand lodge officer.

Starkweather founded the Tucson Blueprint Co., sold it during World War I, bought it back on his return in 1919 and operated the firm until 1947.

He married the former Lilly E. Jettinghoff in Tucson Aug. 6, 1921. Mrs. Starkweather is his only survivor. Funeral plans are being made by Arizona East Mortuary, with the service tentatively set for Monday.— 9-18-12
