Steinbrueck is noted in the art of architectural design for his pioneering work in the field of low-cost residential design, beginning directly after World War II. While building primarily custom residences, Steinbrueck made ingenious use of space, used materials imaginatively (both indigenous Northwest materials and industrial materials not previously used residentially) and combined these characteristics with clear, precise detailing. Briefly, he combined technical know-how with humanistic concern. Him "minimum" houses continue to serve succeeding families handsomely. The same characteristics apply to his larger-scale work, as the Faculty Center. His continuing search for more direct means to permit architecture to better serve society has ennobled the profession for us all.
