Gentlemen:

I am happy to write you as follows in regard to Mr. Philip N. Stern, of Fredericksburg, Va., whose nomination for Fellowship, I am informed, will be before you for action at your coming meeting in February.

My acquaintance with Mr. Stern and my association with him in the Virginia Chapter and on the State Art Commission covers a period of twenty-four years.

He was one of the five members of the Institute who, in 1914, met together and founded the Virginia Chapter. His name appears on this Chapter's Certificate of foundation which is dated Feb. 1, 1915, and his consistent and unflagging interest in the Chapter has contributed continuously to the growth and present standing of the American Institute in this State. He was President of the Chapter for a period of two or three years.

For a number of years now he has been a prominent member of The Art Commission of this State, appointed by the Governor, which Commission is empowered by law to pass on the architecture of all buildings erected with state funds or on state property.

Dear Mr. Kemper:

Thank you for your letter of November 16.

I am quite concerned about this matter of Fellowships. As you well know, the Virginia Chapter has one Fellow in it. It would certainly seem to me that the Virginia Chapter, provided they have qualified men for Fellowship, and I do not believe any one can claim the men recommended are not qualified, should have more than one Fellow. If I am not mistaken, this is the smallest number of any Chapter in The Institute.

As you well know, the Virginia Chapter is one of the fastest growing and most energetic Chapters in The Institute and I for one, believe your Jury on Fellowship gave us very little consideration, if any.

You further recall, I discussed the matter of Fellowships with you some years ago and was told that we were then too late to offer names to the Jury and therefore, would have to wait until they met again. This was complied with exactly.

Unfortunately, I could not attend meeting of the Board of Directors of Virginia Chapter, called recently in Richmond, Va., but I will urge that appropriate action be taken by the Board at its next meeting and that the Board of The Institute be informed of our feelings in the matter. You, of course understand, Mr. Kemper, that this is my personal opinion and is not a formal action of the Board of Virginia Chapter. I am sending copy of this letter to our President, Mr. T. David Fitz-Gibbon and our Secretary, Mr. Clinton H. Cowgill.


Herewith is copy of letter received from Mr. Pendleton S. Clark of the Virginia Chapter, concerning the status of Virginia Chapter fellowship applications.
