Will you please advise me if the handling of "stock" plans and specifications is in accordance with the standard of ethics of the Institute.

During the past several months a number of builders have called at this office for small, moderate priced houses, but apparently will not pay the regular fee for this work, as we are never able to close with them. I have followed up several of these cases and find that the buildings have been built without plans and in each case are an eye-sore to the community.

To meet these conditions it is my thought to prepare fifteen or twenty complete plans and specifications and charge a flat sum for each plan, which would be less than the established rate, retaining the right to sell these plans a number of times. I have never cared for this class of work, but there seems to be a real demand for it, and the community would at least be benefited to the extent of having well designed buildings.

I will greatly appreciate an expression from you, as a representative of the Institute, regarding this matter.

Dear Mr. Wade:

On behalf of the Secretary, Mr. Baldwin - who is out of the city for the summer months - we wish to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of August 14th, with regard to your indebtedness for dues to the Institute, and the discontinuance of your membership on June 30, 1931.

We assure you that it was with much regret that the Institute took such action, but it was thought preferable to allowing a greater indebtedness to incur against your account, which would, in turn, make future reinstatement just that much more of a burden. It is with much pleasure that we learn of your intention to apply for minstatement, and we shall be glad to obtain from you a formal request, through the Secretary of your Chapter, as outlined in the attached excerpt from the By-laws.

As you will note, the requirement for reinstatement is that all past indebtedness must be paid in full - which, in your case, is \$100.00 for Institute dues for the years 1928, 1929, 1930, and 1931. In addition to this, any indebtedness with the Chapter must be satisfactorily arranged, and the letter from the Chapter should so state.

In our letter of August 7th we advised you that the conditions in the building industry are understood perfectly, by the officers of the Institute, and it is not the intention to be too severe on the members for financial conditions resulting therefrom. It is prepared to do everything in its power to assist its members to retain their memberships, in the hope that conditions will soon improve.

The By-laws do not permit partial payments on account before reinstatement, but there will not be a meeting of the Board of Directors until Nevember 19-21, 1931, and perhaps by that time you can artenge to make a substantial payment on your account. In that event, we would be more than glad to bring your application before the Board for consideration, and perhaps special action. However, we would be glad to hear from you in the meantime, with advice as to what you believe you can do along these lines. Of course, if a substantial payment were not made, you can readily see that with the beginning of 1932, \$25.00 additional would be added to your account, and before many months were past, unless you were able to make a still further payment on your dues, you would again become delinquent. It is this condition which the Institute wishes to avoid.

With regard to the stationery you have on hand, bearing the initials "A.I.A." after your name - strictly speaking, this should not be used, and the contuance of its use, in view of your disassociation with the Institute, may bring about much criticism of you and the Institute, as well. However, we do not wish to work a hardship on any of the former members, and this question can remain in abeyance until you have decided what you will be able to do toward your reinstatement in the near future. At that time we can again take up this question. In the meantime, if you should find it necessary to obtain new stationery, it is suggested that the A.I.A. be omitted, until formal action has been taken on your reinstatement.

We shall be glad to hear further from you, on this subject.
