The Architectural Legacy of Clarke Waggaman

Beauty and diversity characterize the work of noted local architect Clarke Waggaman, AIA (1877-1919). The elegant homes he created along Massachusetts Avenue, the Kalorama area, and along the Connecticut Avenue corridor exemplify his fascinating designs, and this tour covers 26 of the architect's most distinguished homes, out of the 135 structures he built in only 12 years.

This afternoon bus tour is led by Washington architect and preservationist **J.L. Sibley Jennings**, AIA, who restored one of the Waggaman homes to be visited, accompanied by **Grace Holtzman**, daughter of Clarke Waggaman, who recounts anecdotal memories of her father. Educated abroad and the recipient of a law degree from Catholic University, Clarke Waggaman started his architectural career without any formal training in architecture. His amazing life was cut short at the age of 42 by illness.
