For 24 years the nominee has been active in the Church Architectural Guild (now the Guild for Religious Architecture). He has served almost continuously for 20 years on the Board of Directors, Executive Committee and as President. For the past 3 years he has been one of 3 members of "The Commission" which is responsible for planning the annual conferences in conjunction with cooperating agencies. It is in this field of establishing a "bridge between theology and architecture" that he has presented his maximum thrust.

For the past 4 years he has been the only architect on the Executive Board of the Commission on Church Architecture for the National Council of Churches. Under their aegis he delivered lectures at various places in the United States, Hawaii and Canada.

He has recently been elected Chairman of the Commission on Architecture, Lutheran Society of Music, Worship and the Arts.

NOMINEE'S ACHIEVEMENTS IN SERVICE TO THE PROFESSION

1. State fully the nominee's signal service to the profession, The Institute, his chapter, or his state organization, which the nominators believe has notably contributed to the advancement of the profession, and list the offices in architectural organizations occupied by the nominee and the period of each.

In connection with the Philadelphia Chapter of the American Institute of Architects, Mr. Wagoner held the following offices:

He served as a Director in the years 1958, 1959, and 1960

He served as Second Vice-President in 1961

He served as Vice-President in 1962

He served as President in 1963

Among the items of work accomplished during this administration are three that are outstanding.

1. Expansion:

The planning to increase the range of activities of the Philadelphia Chapter of the A.I.A. by acquiring the services of an Executive Secretary and by moving to the first floor of the Architect building and providing more adequate quarters for the anticipated activity. Provisions were made to increase the revenue to permit of such expanded activity. All of the above was subsequently accomplished.

2. By-Laws - Revision

The reasons for the revision of the By-Laws were the need to accommodate current operating procedures of recent years, to provide for changed committee activities, to accommodate mandatory regulations of the Institute, and some of the Institute Recommendations. These latter included those contained in the Institute's "Advisory Form of Chapter By-Laws" as revised in June, 1963.

On July 16, 1963 the By-Laws were approved by the Chapter with minor revisions.

3. Specification Outline - Publication

The purpose of this outline is to give to the Building Industry of the Philadelphia area, which includes the Architects, Engineers, Contractors, and Producers, a standard, acceptable form to follow which will

- 1. Aid Specification writers to arrange the main divisions of their specifications by recognized trades.
- 2. Give the estimators the needed information to procure the required cost estimates without confusion.
- 3. Give the dealers in services and materials an opportunity to find the needed information in the locations where it normally belongs.

Provisions for revision was made as might be needed due to non-availability of materials or introduction of new materials or due to new methods of installation or application of materials.

The publication of this outline was authorized by the Executive Board and date of issue was March, 1963.
