Responding to yours of August 19th, it was hoped that the enclosed note of explanation of July 15th, from the Treasurer, would explain the matter of dues.

In January, 1926, the dues were \$20.00 a year if paid in January, and \$25.00 a year if paid after January.

The Convention in May increased the dues to \$25.00 a year for everybody, effective July 1, 1926.

Therefore, those who had paid \$20.00 in January were billed for \$2.50; and those who paid \$20.00 after January, as in your case, were billed \$5.00, of which \$2.50 covers the increase and of which the remaining \$2.50 is a prorate of the \$5.00 to July 1st. You paid your dues in April, but only paid \$20.00 and you were therefore indebted for \$5.00 additional, as prescribed in the By-laws - until they were changed at the Convention.

In other words, this \$5.00 was cut in half by action of the Convention, but the increase in dues was made effective July 1st, so all members of your class are indebted for \$5.00 at this time.

For details concerning the increase in dues see the report of the Board to the Convention; also the Treasurer's report, as contained in the Proceedings.

If the above explanation seems too involved, do not hesitate to write again and I will endeavor to answer any questions.

I fail to understand the right of the Institute to exact \$5.00 additional for dues if not paid in January, even though it is now written in the By-laws. It savors too much of usury.


