Gentlemen:

I have received your notice dated March 1, 1923, containing a list of Architects in the Boston Chapter proposed for advancement to Fellowship in the Institute and beg to comment on it.

It seems very suitable that Messrs. Collens and Walsh should receive this distinction, but not at all suitable that the other gentlemen, Messrs. Jenney, Schweinfurth and Stevens should receive it.

Two of them, Messrs. Jenney and Stevens are known to me personally, and all of them professionally. Mr. Jenney has long been a teacher at the Institute of Technology. Mr. Schweinfurth has built a great many school buildings in this vicinity, and Mr. Stevens many hospitals in various parts of the country.

I assume that a Fellowship is meant to denote really great distinction — such a meaning is clearly suggested to me by the list of present Fellows. Mr. Jenney's position, respected as it is by his students and associates, does not seem to me to possess at all this outstanding quality, such distinction for example, as Professor Emerson of Technology now represents, or such as the late Professor Warren of Harvard so long exemplified, or such as Professor Duquesne displayed while he was on the staff of the Harvard School.

As I think of the Architects of school buildings several names occur to me as of men who have done excellent work, and the name of Mr. Schweinfurth is not near the head of the list. Undoubtedly he is one of many, but not distinguished among us.

Mr. Stevens' hospitals, and his views on the subject in general are well known. It is said to be his contention that beauty - architectural design is incompatible with good hospital planning, and as I look at his work I believe that in his case it is so, but that does not constitute a distinguished contribution to the profession.

To confer Fellowships on these gentlemen would tend decidedly to lower the professional distinction which this rank now conveys.

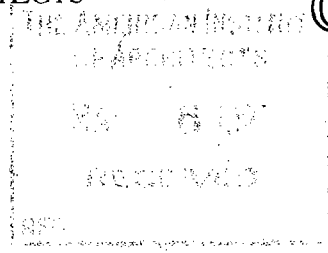
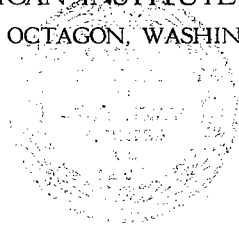

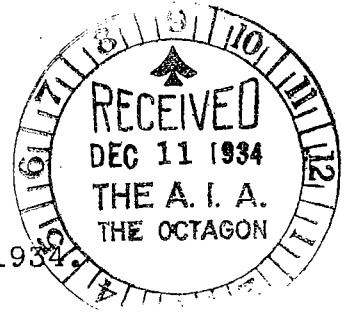
