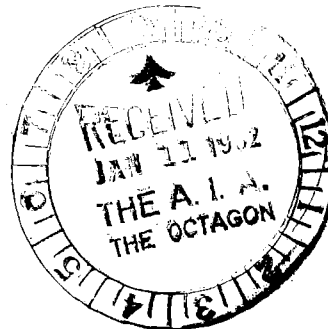

Dear Mr. Wanger:

We are indeed sorry to receive your letter of January 8th, tendering your resignation as a member of The American Institute of Architects.

The Officers and Directors will be sorry to lose your support of the profession and the Institute in its work.

In order to comply with the By-Law requirements, in the submission of resignations, we wish to call to your attention the marked excerpt from the By-Laws attached, from which you will note that a resignation should come forward through the Secretary or Treasurer of the Chapter to which you are assigned, with the endorsement of the Chapter thereon.

As soon as the Chapter's approval is received, we will be in a position to place your resignation before the Executive Committee, which meets in Washington the latter part of February.

The above is a general statement on resignation procedure. But the Institute is greatly concerned at the prospective loss of good members who have encountered financial difficulties. It has been carrying those members for at least two years, and inasmuch as your dues are paid to December 31, 1931, the sincere hope is expressed that you will allow your membership to continue during 1932. By that time things may be much brighter.

In this crisis, the Institute, as the national society of the architectural profession, and the local Chapter, as its embodiment in the community, greatly need the moral support of the leading members of the profession - as such support is evidenced by their interest and membership.

But in case you feel that the resignation must go through, there is no doubt but that the Board would gladly reinstate you at some future date.

Dear Sirs:

The Minutes of the recent meeting of the Executive Committee are now completed, and we are in a position to advise you formally with regard to the action taken on your letters of January 8, 1932, in which you submitted your resignations from membership in the Institute.

Inasmuch as the approval of the Arkansas Chapter was not received until November 15, 1932 (and then, with great reluctance) the first opportunity to submit the matter to the Executive Committee was at its meeting in November, 1932. The Committee voted not to accept your resignations, as it prefers to continue you as Institute members of the Arkansas Chapter throughout the year 1933. It asks that you accept this decision and continue your support of the Chapter.

By the end of 1933 conditions may have materially improved, but if they have not, and if you so request, your resignations will be accepted by the Institute as of December 31, 1932, subject, of course, to your status as a member at the time the resignations were submitted.

In the meantime, the Institute asks for your active support, both of the national organization and of the Arkansas Chapter.

The tide cannot run out forever, and many people believe a turn for the better in the whole economic situation will take place in 1933.

May I add a personal word to the foregoing? We simply cannot afford to lose from the Institute men like yourselves. The Institute is going the limit in cooperating with its members who are faced with financial difficulties, and in turn it is depending upon their moral support and continued interest. We must stand together, and we must carry on.

Copies of this letter have been sent to Mr. Furbringer, your Regional Director; and to Mr. Wittenberg, President, and Mr. Delony, Secretary, of the Arkansas Chapter.


