

HIS WORK IN THE TVA WENT FAR BEYOND THAT WHICH IS GENERALLY TERMED ARCHITECTURE. AS ONE OF THE PRINCIPAL TECHNICIANS EMPLOYED BY THE AUTHORITY, HE TOOK A PLACE OF LEADERSHIP AND PLAYED AN IMPORTANT PART IN CO-ORDINATING THE SCHEMES FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE RIVER. WANK, ROLAND ANTHONY, F.A.I.A., New York, N. Y.

Roland Anthony Wank has been advanced to Fellowship for achievement in design. Under his leadership as Head Architect the Tennesec Valley Authority erected dams and related structures that are among the finest examples of architectural and engineering accomplishment in the world. Wank's work with TVA went far beyond that which is generally termed architecture, for as a planning expert and one of the principal technicians employed by the Authority he occupied a position of authority and played an important part in the overall development of the entire project.

Wank was born in Budapest, 1898, and attended the Gymnasium. Academy of Beaux Arts and Royal Mechanical University in that city. He took a degree in architectural engineering at the Technical University in Brno, Czechoslovakia, 1921. After work in architectural and engineering firms in Europe, he came to the United States in 1924 and was naturalized in 1930. From 1924 to 1933 he was associated with the architectural firms of George Springsteen and Fellheimer and Wagner, during which time he served as chief designer for the Grand Street Apartments, New York (Springsteen and Goldhammer) and the Union Terminal in Cincinnati (Fellheimer and Wagner), which won gold medal awards from the American Institute of Architects. From 1933 to 1944 he worked with the United States Government at TVA, as chief architect for the Rural Electrification Administration and as consultant to other Federal agencies. He was chief designer for Albert Kahn Associates in Detroit, 1944-45 and since then has been a partner in the firm of Follheimer and Wagner, with offices at 155 East 42 Street, New York City. He was architectural consultant to United Nations Headquarters, 1946-47; and since leaving TVA he has continued his association with that agency in the capacity of Chief Consulting Architect.

While at TVA Wank designed dams, powerhouses, bridges and related structures; also housing projects, schools, recreation and other community facilities. His use of rough formboards to give texture to concrete walls has been highly commended, both for its aesthetic effect and for economy. He originated a streamlined gantry crane which effected appreciable savings in masonry maintenance, and was responsible for the brige lighting from rails used at Norris, Pickwick and Wheeler dams, the plaze lighting from low louvered fixtures and the glarcless lighting for parking areas. He designed six types of prefebricated unit housing, of which about 10,000 units were used at various TVA projects and at Oak Ridge. He designed the first prefabricated aluminum shower booths for use at the town of Norris. He worked with TVA and the Royal British Commission on three-dimensional sectional prefabrication of dwellings, libraries, schools and other buildings.

WANK, ROLAND ANTHONY, F.A.I.A., New York, N. Y. - 2 -

His work at Greenhills was really that of a planner and architect, not only designing the buildings but participating in the overall scheme for the town and facilities. As chief consulting architect for the Rural Electrification Administration he designed power plants, municipal buildings, power department, operating and maintenance buildings and rural centers.

While with Albert Kahn, Wank designed industrial plants, including the Philadelphia Inquirer, the Bond Factory, Rochester, and eight major automobile plants for Ford and General Motors, a typical example of which is the Ford plant in St. Louis.


More recently he has completed the Johnson and Johnson Shipping Building at Metuchen, New Jersey. He is currently in charge of work for the New Jersey Turnpike Authority, doing economic and site planning, design of all building structures and architectural design of engineering structures.

Wank has written numerous articles on architecture, community planning and housing for magazines, text books, reports, and published symposia. He was design critic at Princeton University School of Architecture in 1947, and has lectured at Harvard, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and the University of Tennessee.

Elected to membership in the A.I.A. in 1940, Wank served recently as chairman of an Institute Committee to review a major government study of Atom Bomb Defense. He served on housing, technical, and other committees of the New York Chapter.

Wank has written a number of programs and served on juries for the Beaux Arts Institute of Design, and has been on many architectural juries of award, including the Jefferson National Memorial Expansion Commission, St. Louis, 1947-48.

He is a member of the American Institute of Planners, National Planning Association, and the National Association of Housing Officials, and has served on committees for these organizations.

Former TVA Head Architect Roland Wank

NEW ROCHELLE, N.Y., April 24 (AP) - Roland A. Wank, head architect of the Tennessee Valley Authority from 1933 to 1944, died Wednesday of cancer in a fospital here. He was 71.

Mr. Wank designed towns, public housing projects and many important buildings. He was described by a friend as "an architect's ar-chitect who avoided sensatronalism and rejected faddism as a scourge which in short time will date buildings."

Born in Budapest in 1898, he studied at the Royal Po-Lytechnicum there, the Technical University of Brunn and the College of Beaux Arts and the School of Applied Arts in Budapest.

Mr. Wank was chief architect for the Greenhills (Ohio) Resettlement Project,

chief consulting architect for the Rural Electrification Administration and architectural consultant for the United Nations Headquarters Commission.

While with the TVA he recognized his problem as not merely one of reworking the original plans of engineers but as "a new phase in architecture." His job was "to make sure that the dams look as efficient as the engineers have made them" and also to show "that a public architecture can be a great architecture," he said.

To house workers and future settlers around Norris Dam, Norris, Tenn., was built.

Mr. Wank ,who became a naturalized American citizen in 1930, had been a senior partner in the architectural firm of Wank, Adams and Slavin. He received gold medals from the American Institute of Architects for his work on New York City's Grand Street Apartments and Cincinnati's Union Terminal.

Among other buildings Mr. Wank designed were: Hoffman Laffoche Laboratories, Nutley N.J.; Remsen Hall, Queens College; Eastman Kodak laboratories, Rochester, N.Y.; the General

Hospital, Ein hurst, Queens, N.Y.; and the First National City Bank Building in Lima, Peru.
