At the time the house was designed Reg Knight and
I were practicing a 5 East 57th St. NYC under the firm
name of Ward-Knight. We were young at the game and

ion - thus "associate" on the award. When I was

was a classmate of mine at MIT and I feel foolish

Award-winning architect Jasper D. Ward dies at 80 He opposed decision to build Interstate 64 along Ohio River

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Award-winning Louisville architect Jasper D. Ward, who designed the Student Activities Center at the University of Louisville, co-designed the riverfront Belvedere and for more than 40 years lobbied against haphazard development in Jefferson County, **died** yesterday. He was 80.

"Jasper was a local architectural legend," said Steve Wiser, president of the Louisville Historical League and former president of the Central Kentucky chapter of the American Institute of **Architects**. "Many landmark buildings in downtown Louisville were designed by Jasper Ward. . . . Everything Jasper did had a sculptural quality to it."

Ward, who was the father of former 3rd District U.S. Rep. Mike Ward, **died** at Jewish Hospital; he had suffered a stroke on Friday.

Ward served in the Army Corps of Engineers during World War II and earned his bachelor's degree in architecture in 1948 from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

A native of Flemington, N.J., he moved with his wife and three children to Louisville in the mid-1950s to work for General Electric Co., but was fired six months after arriving when the company abandoned a project called Homes for the Future, Mike Ward said yesterday.

Jasper Ward moved to Chappaqua, N.Y., in 1956, but returned to Louisville in less than a year when he landed a job at Reynolds Metals Co.

Reynolds announced two years later that it would move to Virginia, so in 1958 Ward "just hung out his shingle," his son said.

WARD BECAME president of the Citizens Metropolitan Planning Council and chairman of a committee of the Louisville Chapter of the American Institute of **Architects** soon after starting his own firm.

Although he fought some forms of development, he designed numerous structures that earned awards from local and national architectural groups.

In addition to designing the Belvedere with Larry Melillo, Ward won awards from the Kentucky Society of **Architects** for the parking Authority of River City garage at 120 S. Sixth St. (in association with Luckett & Farley **Architects**), the auditorium and music building at the Kentucky School for the Blind, the Louisville Gardens parking garage, Portland Elementary School and the Neighborhood Settlement House in Portland.

His designs of three parking garages - the two on Sixth Street and one at Magazine and Seventh streets serving the federal buildings - were proof that the structures could overcome a utilitarian, concrete stereotype with elements such as curving glass stairwells.

Reviews from the Kentucky Society of **Architects** describing his work on Neighborhood Settlement House said they were impressed with how he "considered every detail in connection with every other detail" and with his ability to design a "low-maintenance building without detracting from the appearance."

His design for the building for City Blue Print Co. at 140 W. Jefferson St. went into the permanent collection of the Museum of Modern Art in New York in 1984.

He won a National Award of Merit in 1956 from the American Institute of **Architects** for his design of the Walter P. Swain House in Watchung, N.J.

In the 1960s, as an associate of the principal architectural firm Daniel Mann Johnson & Mendenhall of Washington, Ward worked on the design of the Louisville Zoo.

WARD, AN outspoken community activist, was perpetually frustrated by what he believed was Jefferson County's failure to thoughtfully plan development and to exempt some land from development.

As president of the volunteer group called Citizens Metropolitan Planning Council in the early 1960s, Ward advocated volunteer regulation of billboards. He said regulation might "give our poor, callused eyeballs a rest."

Ward was particularly opposed to the location of the "Riverside Expressway" - now the downtown portion of Interstate 64. He argued that it would be a barrier between the city and the Ohio River.

Recently, Ward was a member of the Cornerstone 2020 group responsible for writing the county's comprehensive land-use plan, but he was not pleased with the outcome.

It did not propose desired uses for all of the county and instead did "little more than enlarge upon the present conditions existing in the county," according to Ward.

He said, "We did this 30 years ago, and the same thing is happening all over again. . . . In another 30 years, I'm going to be too old."

Ward's wife, Lucretia "Lukey" Ward - a prominent civil rights advocate - **died** in 1996 at age 74.

In addition to his son Mike, Ward is survived by four other children, Teka, Abby and Jim Ward, and Nick Eaton. Pearson's Funeral Home is handling arrangements.

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LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) - Jasper Ward, an award-winning architect who designed the Student Activities Center at the University of Louisville and co-designed the riverfront Belvedere **died** Sunday at age 80.

Ward, the father of former 3rd District U.S. Rep. Mike Ward, **died** at Jewish Hospital two days after he suffered a stroke.

Ward served in the Army Corps of Engineers during World War II and earned his bachelor's degree in architecture in 1948 from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

A native of Flemington, N.J., he moved with his wife and three children to Louisville in the mid-1950s to work for General Electric Co. He was fired six months later and moved to Chappaqua, N.Y., in 1956.

He returned to Louisville in less than a year when he landed a job at Reynolds Metals Co. He later became president of the Citizens Metropolitan Planning Council and chairman of a committee of the Louisville Chapter of the American Institute of **Architects** soon after starting his own firm.
