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Harvey H. Warwick, 79, an architect and builder, died tic ad Sunday at Suburban Hospital nt after suffering a heart attack.

He had helped design the Westchester Apartments at Day 4000 Cathedral Ave. NW. and Io also Colonial Village in Arling-lar ton, which was considered a pioneer in garden-type apart- FI ments.

Born/ in Kansas City, Mo., Mr. Warwick came to Washington as a young man. He was in partnership with Louis Justement at one time and then had his own business. He was in semiretirement in recent Fi years.

Mr. Warwick was a member of the American Institute of WI Architects, D.C. and Mary-ab land architect/ organizations sethe American Hemerocalles Society and the National Capitol Day Lily Club.
