Throughout his architectural career, Bertram Weber has maintained a high standard of architectural design, and by constant endeavor rendered service to his clients and the profession resulting in superior design performance, both on small works, many under difficult circumstances, as well as on larger work affording greater opportunity for architectural expression.

The diversity of the work of the nominee has indicated a standard of excellence in design in monumental, institutional, and commercial, as well as in domestic work. Especially notable has been his individual and distinctive design in private work, in the institutional and residential fields. The consistent merit in design is a product of instinctive ability, and the nominee's unrelenting persistence and patience in producing the most successful solution with the best possible design result from the problem at hand.

His work reveals a deep appreciation and knowledge of the proper use of materials, the refinement and discriminating use of detail, and the careful interrelation of parts in the scale of design. A nice discrimination in the use of color and material texture, and ability to obtain on the job workmanship texture adds individual distinction to the completed work.

The influence of the recognition of the nominee's design has contributed to the betterment of the standards of the profession, and has added public recognition to quality in professional architectural service, with particular emphasis on the nominee's contribution in the residential field.

Bertram Weber, architect for 64 years

Bertram A. Weber, 91, an architect in Chicago for 64 years, was very productive and designed many residences, public institutions, factories, hospitals and churches in the city and suburbs as well as throughout the Midwest.

Services for Mr. Weber will be held at 11 a.m. Wednesday in the chapel at John Knox Village in Pompano Beach, Fla. He died Sunday at home in Pompano Beach.

"His focus was quality architecture in a traditional sense," said his son, John, also an architect. "His designs were original and included public buildings and homes in gothic and colonial. His work was always quality. He designed, for example, many of the earliest homes in Inverness.

Mr. Weber was the son of Peter J. Weber, a noted Chicago architect who was associated with the

firm of Daniel H. Burnham and who designed a number of buildings in the Loop and for the World's Columbian Exposition in Chicago in 1893.

A native of Evanston, Mr. Weber graduated from Northwestern University and received a degree in architecture from Massachusetts Institute of Technology. After his father died in 1923, he took over the practice and in 1924 formed White & Weber. In 1937, when his partner, Charles White, died, the name was changed to Bertram A. Weber, Architect.

In 1973, it became Weber & Weber, when he went into partner-

ship with his son.

While his expertise was general, he is perhaps best remembered for his residential designs, especially for northwest suburban and North Shore homes. He also designed the De Kalb Public Library, the Oak Park Post Office, the Highland Park Public Library and the Aurora YMCA. His designs include many hospitals in the Detroit area and several additions to Chicago Osteopathic Hospital.

He was the architect for the Florsheim and Dr. Scholl shee factories. Mr. Weber also designed the mausoleum chapel in Waldheim Cemetery on 1st Avenue in Forest Park, as well as a number of Episcopalian churches, including St. James Church in Northbrook; St. Gregory's Church, Deerfield; St. Timothy's, Griffith, Ind.; and All

Saints Church, Western Springs.

He was the architect for public schools in Highland Park and for several Chicago-area country clubs.

Mr. Weber was a fellow of the American Institute of Architects and of the Illinois Society of Ar-

Survivors, besides his son, include his wife, Dorothea, and four granddaughters.

Bertram Weber, 91, architect

Bertram A. Weber, 91, a retired Chicago area architect, died Sunday in his Pompano Beach, Fla.,

Mr. Weber graduated from the Massachussetts Institute of Technology in 1923 and began his practice the same year when he co-founded White and Weber Architects. It evolved into Bertram A. Weber Architects in 1936. He and his son formed Weber and Weber of Northbrook in 1973. Mr. Weber retired in 1987.

Among his works were private residences, commercial buildings, schools, hospitals and country clubs. In 1958, he earned the title "Fellow" from the American Institute of Architects for his design of the Evans Scholars Foundation building in north suburban Golf.

Mr. Bertram, who was born in Evanston, was a resident of Highland Park for more than 50 years. He was a past president of the Builders Club of Chicago, a member of the Adventurers Club and was a life trustee of the Ravinia Festival Association.

Survivors include his wife, Dorothea; a son, John; and four grandchildren. Memorial services will be announced at a later date.
