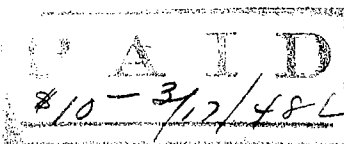

The Nominee has made notable contributions in the fields of church design and special facilities design. His firm has received national and regional recognition for Catholic church work, and regional recognition for buildings of mental health. He has strongly contributed to the field of secondary school design by planning complete facilities with an air conditioned environment for Arizona's hot arid climate, and using electrical energy to accomplish the requirements. He has shown understanding and given strength to the use of modular concrete structures expressed in the bold and simple structural systems and their flexibility and economy through the knowledge of his subject. His understanding and belief in strong and well drafted contract documents, and administration of the work has been an incentive to the younger professionals in the area and has greatly contributed to the general upgrading of the construction industries in the area, as well as a more appreciative understanding of our profession.

CLARIFICATION OF "LIST OF ACHIEVEMENTS FOR PUBLIC SERVICE"

1. Member of the Advisory Board to the City of Phoenix Building Code - 1954-'55 -

This body determines the suitability of alternate materials and construction methods, and to permit interpretations of the provisions of the Code.

2. Co-Chairman of Legislative Committee to Arizona State Legislature -

To work with the proper Legislative Committees of the State Legislature to defeat a proposed legislative act for the establishment of a State Architect for the design and production of working drawings for all State buildings except the Board of Regents and State Highway Department. December and January of 1954.

3. Co-Chairman of Legislative Committee to Arizona State Legislature -

To work for a State Planning Commission. The successful defeat of the Act for a State Architect in 1954 led to the effort for a State Planning Commission by different State Representatives. The Arizona Chapters of the American Institute of Architects believed they could support this effort if the Act was properly written. I served with Les Mahoney, Architect, (Chairman) and Al Rasor (Attorney for the Architects) to work with the different Legislative Committees to control the writing of the Act and to so write it that it would discourage any future attempts at creating a State Architect, by a Legislative Act or through this proposed agency. As a result, the Architects with the above legal council were successful in obtaining the right to write the Act and work for its approval. As a result, there have been no strong attempts for a State Architect in recent years, and the State Planning Commission is operating within its described area of advising State Agencies and the Legislature pertaining to long range planning and building priorities. Private Architects are then retained for the work. The statute has been successful since its start in 1955.

4. Appointed a Member to the City of Phoenix Planning Commission by the Phoenix City Council under Mayor Hohen Foster in 1953 -

The duties of this body are to (1) make recommendations to the City Council on all matters that might be referred to it by said City Council concerning or relating to a comprehensive plan of city building and improvement, and (2) to recommend to the City Council Amendments to the City Charter, Ordinances providing for the purchase of sites for city buildings, parks and improvements, providing for vacating, opening, widening, or other changes in streets and public ways, and the ornamentation of such sites, streets, grounds and other public places, and such others as it may deem necessary and proper and that may tend in connection with comprehensive plan to promote the public health, comfort, safety, convenience, utility and welfare. (3) The City Planning Commission is also authorized to confer and advise with other similar City Planning Commissions or County Planning Commissions.

5. Chairman of Legislative Committee, in cooperation with the Construction Industries, to State Legislature -

In an attempt to create enabling legislation through the State Legislature for the establishment of County Building Codes 1956. The efforts of this Committee, with the backing of the Architects, was defeated.

6. Co-Chairman of Legislative Committee, in cooperation with the Construction Industries, to State Legislature -

In again attempting to create enabling legislation at the State Legislature for the establishment of County Building Codes 1957. The efforts of this Committee, with the backing of the Architects, was again defeated.

7. Member of the City of Phoenix Planning Commission - 1954-'56.

8. Member of Committee for City of Phoenix - Operating under the Provisions of the City Planning Commission -

To revise the City of Phoenix Zoning Ordinance 1955.

9. Co-Chairman of Committee for Phoenix Planning Commission to work with the Maricopa County Planning Commission -

In attempting to secure cooperation between the Maricopa County Planning Commission and the City of Phoenix Planning Commission for cooperative efforts in zoning of new areas within a three mile distance of the Phoenix City Limits; also, attempt to gain funds from the Maricopa County Supervisors and the City Council of Phoenix for the preparation of use maps on a county level - 1956. The early work of our Committee advanced the success of these studies and better cooperative effort between the two groups.

10. Member of City of Phoenix' Citizens Growth Committee -

For the study and evaluation of the City's needs for a bond issue to finance needed improvements - 1956 (Bond issue successful).

- a) My specific assignment - The City's Committee to study the need for the purchase of private water companies. Our report was affirmative.

The Dons' Club of Phoenix is a national and internationally recognized organization for its efforts in public service. It has been organized since 1930, and from its inception, its membership has been limited to fifty men at one time. Its members are business and professional men of the community who are vitally interested in the preservation of the historical lore of the Southwest, historical buildings, historical locations, sites of natural beauty and the preservation of the natural resources of our country.

The name of Dons' was taken from the Spanish Dons' whose culture influenced the history of our State. The Dons' Club follows this interest by publicly conveying residents and tourists to these points of historical interest by regularly scheduled and guided tours during the winter months. Each tourist season of each year is finalized by an all-day trek to the historical Superstition Mountains where over 2,400 people are entertained by the Dons' in an all-day and evening program. 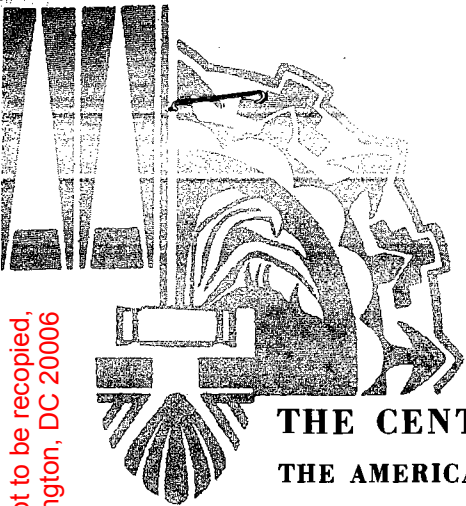




