#### NARRATIVE OF ACHIEVEMENTS

John A. Welch has been a consummate and well-rounded professional who has utilized his talents and training not only in the practice of architecture, but in the training of others and in assisting institutions and citizens within this immediate community.

Dean John Welch was an educator for the majority of his professional career. He was a professor of architecture at Howard University and Tuskegee Institute. While he was Dean at Tuskegee, the architectural program was elevated to a professional program and received its first accreditation. In recognition of his effective service as Dean of Mechanical Industries, and later Applied Sciences, Tuskegee Institute conferred the title of Dean Emeritus to Mr. Welch in 1980.

He has been active in the American Institute of Architects for more than twenty five years. He is a charter member of the East Alabama Chapter and has served as vice president and director for the chapter.

He was one of the first Black Architects to become registered in Alabama and active in the AIA. He is also registered in the District of Columbia and certified by N.C.A.R.B.

His professional career has been long and broad, which is a testimony to his driving energy, professional capabilities, and willingness to lend his training and background to assist others.

## Biographical Data

John Austin Welch was born in Tuskegee, Alabama, and received his early education at the Washington Public School and the Vocational Department of Tuskegee Normal and Industrial Institute where he specialized in Plumbing and received a diploma in 1923. His high school work was completed at Dumbar High School, Washington, D.C., in 1925. He pursued his college studies at Howard University, Washington, D.C., and was awarded the Bachelor of Science Degree in Architecture in 1930, and commissioned a Second Lieutenant, Infantry, Officers' Reserve Corps, Army of the United States. He received the Master of Architecture Degree at The Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C., in 1952.

His experiences have been varied. Following graduation from Howard University, he worked in the Department of Buildings and Grounds of the University, and later, as a draftsman for the architectural firm of Robinson and Williams in Washington, D.C. From August 1940, to March 1941, he served as Head of the Department of Architecture and Mechanical Drawing at Tuskegee Institute. This service was interrupted by a tour of active duty in the Armed Forces.

From March 1941 to October 1947, he was on extended active duty with the United States Army with a portion of this time---August 1941, to July 1946---being served as Professor of Military Science and Tactics of Tuskegee Institute's new Senior Infantry ROTC Unit. During the last two years of this assignment, he also served as Commandant (Dean of Men) of Tuskegee Institute. His tour of duty in the Armed Forces included service in the Pacific Theater of Operations. He was separated from the service in October 1947, in the grade of Lieutenant Colonel, Officers' Reserve Corps, Army of the United States, and is now in a retired status.

From 1947 to 1953, he served as a designer and associate in the office of Louis Edwin Fry, Architect, Washington, D.C., and on January 1, 1954, he became a partner in the firm of Fry  $\xi$  Welch, Architects. As a principal in this firm, he had a major role in the design and construction of many college and public buildings. Some of the major projects are as follows:

- --- Seven dormitories for men and women at Tuskegee Institute.
- --- The Tuskegee Chapel; Paul Rudolph, Associate Architect.
- --- Major addition and alteration to John A. Andrew Medical Center, Tuskegee Institute; joint venture with William H. Metcalf, Jr., Architect, Washington, D.C.
- --- Montana Terrace Housing Project, Washington, D.C.
- --- Takoma Elementary School, Washington, D.C.
- --- United House of Prayer, Washington, D.C.
- --- Consultant to Tuskegee Institute during the construction phase of a major addition and alterations to the School of Veterinary Medicine.

His work in education also included an Assistant Professorship in the Department of Architecture at Howard University from September 1, 1954, to June 30, 1957. From September 1957, to November 30, 1972 (effective date of retirement) he served Tuskegee Institute again in the following capacities: Professor in Architecture and Dean, School of Mechanical Industries, September 1957 to May 1968; Chairman, Administrative Committee, School of Applied Sciences, September 1968 to August 31, 1969, and Dean, School of Applied Sciences, September 1, 1969, to November 30, 1972. The Department of Architecture was a major area of study in the School of Mechanical Industries, and subsequently, the School of Applied Sciences. While he was serving in these capacities, the architectural program was elevated to the professional level and received its first accreditation. In recognition of his leadership and effective service, Tuskegee Institute conferred upon him the title: Dean Emeritus, in 1980.

He has received the following awards:

- June, 1961 The Outstanding Alumnus Award from the School of Engineering and Architecture, Howard University.
- March, 1965 Honored by the Tuskegee Institute Chapter, National Scabbard and Blade Society for services during the early stages of development of the Senior Infantry ROTC Unit at Tuskegee Institute.
- October, 1968 The Tuskegee Southeastern Alumni Association Meritorious Award for Distinguished Services to Alma Mater, Alumni and Community.
- October, 1974 The Howard University Alumni Federation Meritorious Award for Conspicuous Service to Architecture and Education.
- May, 1976 The Tuskegee Institute Alumni Merit Award for Distinguished Service in Advancing Human Welfare.
- August, 1976 Tuskegee National Alumni Merit Award for Leadership in Alumni Affairs, Service to Alma Mater and Community.
- October, 1977 Tuskegee Institute Alumni Association Award for Untiring and Devoted Service to the Architectural Profession and Tuskegee Institute's Department of Architecture; its Students and Alumni.
- October, 1982 1857 1982 (The first 125 years) Citation on the Occasion of the 125th Anniversary of The American Institute of Architects and in recognition of inspired and outstanding service to the Profession of Architecture and the Institute.

He is a registered architect in the State of Alabama and the District of Columbia and holds registration with the National Council of Architectural Registration Boards. He has been a member of the American Institute of Architects for more

than 30 years, and is a Charter Member of the East Alabama Chapter (formerly Auburn Chapter) and has served as Vice-President and Director. He is one of the first Negro Architects to be admitted to a Southern Chapter of the American Institute of Architects and he is currently an emeritus member. He is a life member of Tau Beta Pi, National Engineering Honor Society, and member of Kappa Delta Pi, an International Honor Society in Education.

He is a member of the Tuskegee Institute Alumni Architectural Association, Veterans of Foreign Wars (Life Member), Tuskegee Civic Association (Life Member), and Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc. (Life Member). He is Chairman of Presidential Associates of Tuskegee Institute, and former Co-Chairman of the Howard University Bequests Committee.

He is active in community, civic and Church affairs. He has been a member of and served as Secretary of the Tuskegee City Planning Commission since 1965. He is a member of the executive board of the Tuckabatchee Area Council, Boy Scouts of America.
