You no doubt are familiar with the requirements of the Colorado State Board of Examiners, and will find that I have a license by examination in that State.





My dear Mr. Boyd,-

I wish to thank you for the prompt attention paid my letters concerning dues and Cottage Group Orphanages, and to state that I found the replies awaiting me in New York.

I found a very picturesque institution in the New York Orphanage at Hastings on the Hudson. The cottages were rather antiquated in their plan arrangement, but the management of the Orphanage is quite worth study, and the exterior architectural treatment of the various buildings is exceptionally pleasing with sufficient variety to avoid monotony, yet every building is carried out on well studied Georgian lines.

The Hebrew Orphanage at Pleasantville, New York, just recently completed was also quite worth while. It is a very large institution and very thoroughly equipped in all its branches. The exteriors in this case showed little study.

Stopped at the Octagon on my return trip arriving on Saturday. Found the offices deserted but was very glad to make the acquaintance of the building.

Hoped to have a personal conference with you concerning conditions in Alabama as the matter is rather delicate to handle by correspondence; however I feel that some action should be taken and must run the risk of having my actions misconstrued.

Guy Stone of the New Orleans chapter has been the man who has endeavored to build up an Alabama Chapter. Years ago, Stone Bros. were a very pregressive firm, and several of the brothers are still doing well in New Orleans. Guy Stone, however has been unfortunate in his fight with liquor to the extent that several of the local Architects made the statement that they would not endeavor to enter the Institute as long as he was representing it. I know that he also started the preliminary work of Orginization in Birmingham, which

has had no further development to my knowledge.

Now I think it rather imperative that we get a chapter under way in the state as soon as pessibleaptwe haverhopesioftgettingea State license for Architects through the next legislature and if we had an institute chapter organized it could assist greatly in the work.

I think it would be well worth sending some member of the Institute who is familiar with orginization work to Birmingham and Montgomery. If the proper interest is manifested there I believe I could secure more members in Mobile.

Found another interesting commission awaiting my return, an Old English Gothic Episcopal church to cost about \$35,000.00, and as it will be rather a small structure I expect to get somthing interesting out of it.

Can you put me on touch with a market for hand-riven cypress clap-boards, (any dimension and thickness). Can ship them by water and so put them into New York, Philadelphia, or Washington at a very reasonable figure.




