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## My dear Snyder:

Your personal letter to me, in which you expressed yourself freely on the unpleasant situation in the Detroit Chapter, is at home and I am replying without direct reference to any specific points therein.

In the first place, I must say that you have my very sincere sympathy and a thorough appreciation of your reasons for feeling discouraged. It is a sad contrast with the fine spirit which used to prevail in the old Michigan Chapter, when ideals appeared to mean something and most of the members lived up to them. I can not help but feel that the whole situation with regard to the way the architects are behaving in Detroit (and the situation is almost as bad in many other parts of the country) is but a part and parcel of the general failure of ideals in all walks of life. Detroit is suffering from the same disease of corruption, bootleggers, immorality, graft, etc., that has attacked other large cities and its reflex on general business morality is undoubtedly at the bottom of the conditions which distress you so greatly.

Thile the Institute has probably failed to meet its opportunities for help to the full extent that might be desired, I do not think it would be fair to charge the Institute with entire responsibility in the matter. After all, it seems to me that the only hope of bringing about better conditions lies in the members who still retain their ideals and are willing to sight the battle and uphold the Institute's standards, irrespective of discouragements and personal sacrifices.

I feel that those who say they can not remain members of the Institute because of the unfair competition by others (whether Institute members or not), are not only weakening the Institute's influence, but are lowering their own standards and must do so at a certain loss of self-respect.

I have had a letter from Mr. Garber, requesting that I hold

up your letter of resignation and stating his belief that you could be induced to reconsider your action. In this connection I wish to call your attention to the fact that under the By-Laws a resignation can not be considered by the Board or the Executive Committee until it has been endorsed or approved by the Executive Committee of the chapter. As we have received no notice of such Chapter action, your letter is of course not in shape for presentation to the Executive Committee, which will meet early in March, and I shall do nothing further about the matter. In the meantime I sincerely hope that we may have a letter from you stating that you do not wish to resign and requesting a withdrawal of the letter you have already written.

I would give anything for an opportunity to talk this matter over with you personally and at length, but as this is impossible I beg that you will feel assured that my personal interest in you remains as it always has been-most genuine.
