I learned that a test case was made with the name of Miss Lois L. Howe of Boston, who is well known and much respected here. The prejudice was so evident before the vote was taken that an opportunity was given her to withdraw. She did not do this and was rejected.

I do not know whether the exclusion of women has since become a written law or whether the attitude is maintained by concensus of opinion. In view of a certain rejection I feel that I would better not apply for admission to the Boston Chapter. The most of my business is in Walthem, where (until last July) I have had my office for about six years.

I shall be glad to have you present the abstract case to your directors and to know what might be done by any women similarly situated.






