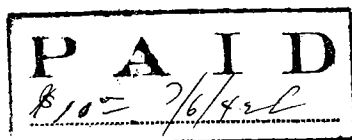

NOMINEE'S ACHIEVEMENT IN ARCHITECTURAL DESIGN

See comments on Page 4 for Mr. Wheeler's work prior to 1944. His work in design since that date has been limited to programming and preliminary planning of many hospitals and other health service buildings. Such design has emphasized plan requirements and has served both to promote the projects and to establish the program requirements. In every case where such buildings have later been constructed, other firms of architects have handled the major architectural responsibility.

Buildings in this category include the following:

Under the general direction of the University architect, Mr. Wheeler prepared detailed requirements program, undertook necessary planning and technical research, and assisted in supervising the architects preparing working drawings and specifications, made preliminary plans and prepared necessary budget data for sixteen major building projects. This work included comprehensive studies of the future University campus, including master plan analysis for a general branch of the University for Chicago. general plan for the Medical Center District, a 305-acre area on Chicago's west side, established in 1941 by State law and already containing three medical schools and numerous hospitals and clinics. This work involved directing research on medical and hospital needs, studying existing hospital and school facilities, writing programs, developing preliminary designs for numerous buildings and preparing block studies and the long-range plan for development. NOMINEE'S ACHIEVEMENT IN PUBLIC SERVICE

E. Todd Wheeler has had a unique career in PUBLIC SERVICE. It is the particular qualities of this career which make it appropriate that he be recognized by election to Fellowship in the American Institute of Architects.

In 1944, after fifteen years of active professional life, eight of which were as a principal in one of the outstanding firms in the Middle West (Perkins, Wheeler and Will), he retired to pursue a career of individual effort, devoted particularly to PUBLIC SERVICE. He was motivated in making the change from association in a large practice to activity on an individual basis by the highest ideals of professional performance.

Mr. Wheeler's continuing objective has been to serve society as an Architect in the fields of public health and welfare, and large-scale community planning. It was apparent to him that there exists a definite need in our economy for a professional Architect to lead and coordinate large, complicated programs from definition of requirements through appropriations of funds, design and construction, to activation of institutions. His unusual performance in this professional area has been recognized by the vast scope of programs with which he has been associated.

Mr. Wheeler's work in connection with the UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS and the MEDICAL CENTER COMMISSION constitute PUBLIC SERVICE in extraordinary degree. In this great project, he had a real part in converting blighted areas of Chicago to an open park-like area for medical institutions. Mr. Wheeler's participation in this project not only was in the capacity of Director of Planning but also as acting Executive Director. The projects with which he was involved in this particular program are listed under NOMINEE'S ACHIEVEMENT IN ARCHITECTURAL DESIGN.

Nominee's Achievement in Public Service (Continued)

From 1950 to 1952, Mr. Wheeler served as Architectural Assistant to C. Herrick Hammond, F.A.I.A., State Supervising Architect. In this capacity, Mr. Wheeler was in charge of the general programming and budgeting of working drawings and specifications, and of taking bids and awarding contracts for the STATE OF ILLINOIS construction program, which then totaled about \$125,000,000. In this work he instituted new, specific methods of assisting the various State departments in determining programs for the various buildings, preparing budget drawings and firm budgets on which appropriations could be based, and keeping budget control during preparation of working drawings and during construction. Mr. Wheeler also initiated policies to have practicing Architects design the major State work, limiting the division staff to small buildings, alterations and maintenance. Mr. Wheeler made an unusual contribution in PUBLIC SERVICE in this program.

In addition to work at the MEDICAL CENTER COMMISSION, UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS, and the work for the STATE OF ILLINOIS, as described above, and other consulting work in the field of hospitals and medical schools, Mr. Wheeler has also performed services for the United Mine Workers of America, described quite completely under NOMINEE'S ACHIEVEMENT IN ARCHITECTURAL DESIGN.

Aside from professional PUBLIC SERVICE described in previous paragraphs, Mr. Wheeler has contributed his time and professional talents in several local programs. These include:

Wilmette Planning Board

Mr. Wheeler has been a citizen member of this Board since its formation in 1946 and is the only remaining member of the original Board. In this time he has held all the offices and is currently Vice Chairman.

This Board, created by five official boards (village, school, park, library and recreation) plans for the growth of the entire

village of 19,000. It recommends action but has no power to carry it out. In its eight years, it has helped bring major improvements, including a new fire and police building, a village garage, more schools, more parks, a new library, auto parking and extension of public utilities.

Chicago Community Fund

For the past four years, Mr. Wheeler has served on the Health Reviewing Committee of the Fund; two of these years he has served as Chairman. This citizen committee is one of approximately ten such. It allocates almost a million dollars annually among the thirteen hospitals, ten clinics and eight general health agencies reviewed. Some thirty members spend ten afternoons during the winter reviewing the service programs and operating budgets of these agencies as a basis for the allocation. The Fund contributes an average of 25% of the agencies' budgets and seeks to assist them in improving their services in the health field.

This year, Mr. Wheeler is serving on the budget committee which studies the allocations recommended by all the reviewing committees and recommends a total budget to the Board of Directors of the Fund. He is also on a special policy committee.

American Hospital Association

Since 1946, Mr. Wheeler has been a personal member of the AHA and has participated in many of their educational sessions on planning and operation, as speaker, panel member or chairman. Their meetings are primarily for hospital administrators, though sometimes trustees, medical staff, Architects and others are also included.

Nominee's Achievement in Public Service (Continued)

Welfare Council of Chicago

This service has been limited to a few times as a member of their nominating committee. Mr. Wheeler is currently on a special committee making an intensive study of the care given the indigent.

The Eleanor Association (Chicago)

This group owns and operates four residential clubs for about 500 girls working in Chicago. Mr. Wheeler has served on the Board for more than a year.

United Cerebral Palsy (Chicago)

As a member of this Board and Executive Committee, Mr. Wheeler has been active on a special committee revising policies with respect to grants. They give about \$250,000 per year in the critical but limited field of the palsied. This work is similar to that done for the Community Fund.

The above activities by an individual Architect represent a singular effort in PUBLIC SERVICE unparalleled throughout the country. Mr. Wheeler recognized the need for leadership by a professional Architect in the creation and management of large construction programs. He has performed this PUBLIC SERVICE in the highest traditions of an Architect and a member of the American Institute of Architects.



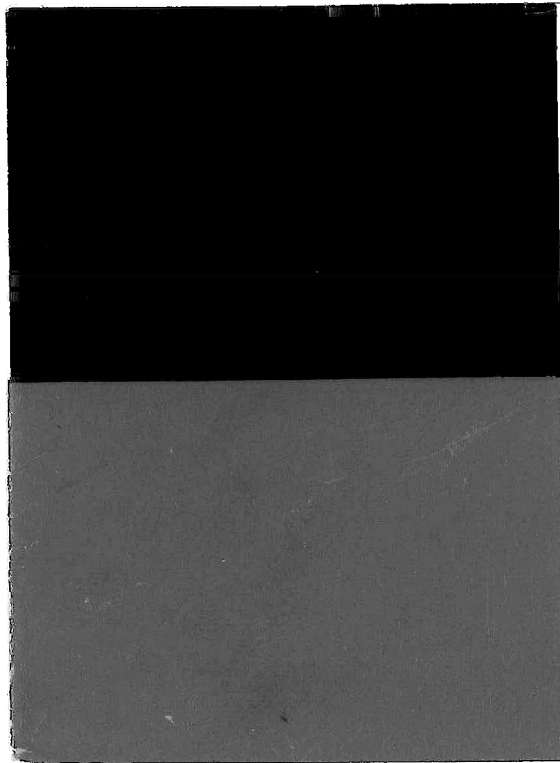

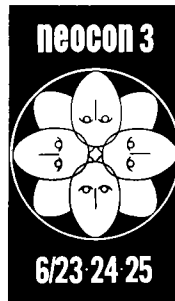
